Over the past few weeks, Rednock students have been busy investigating many fascinating historical eras and events.

Year 7 - Mrs Redman thought that Dan Kennedy produced an excellent piece of work on the subject of 'Does "Bloody Mary" deserve her nickname?' In addition to a well researched table 'for and against' his argument, Dan concluded:


## **Hip-Hop of Shakespeare?**






## **Geography Department**

### The Global Goals


The ones we need to create a sustainable city would be:

- Mirrors in space
