Dear Parents/Carers and Students,

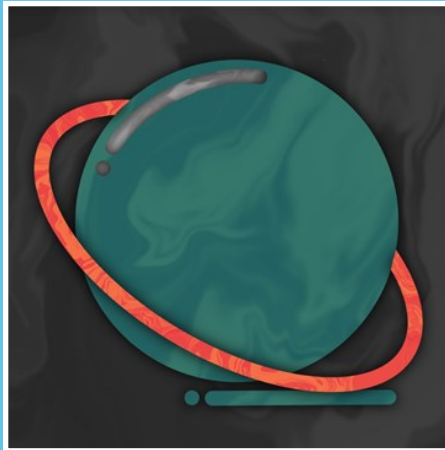
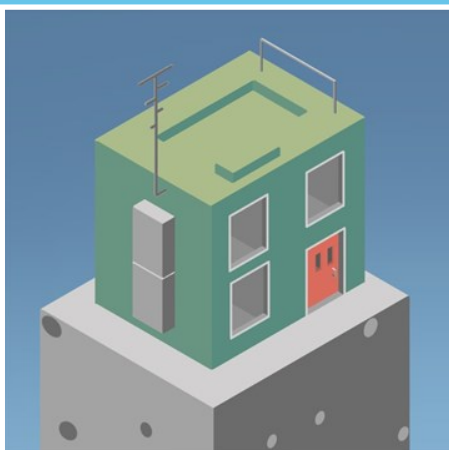

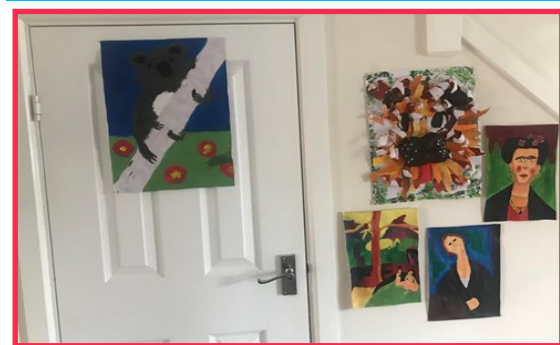
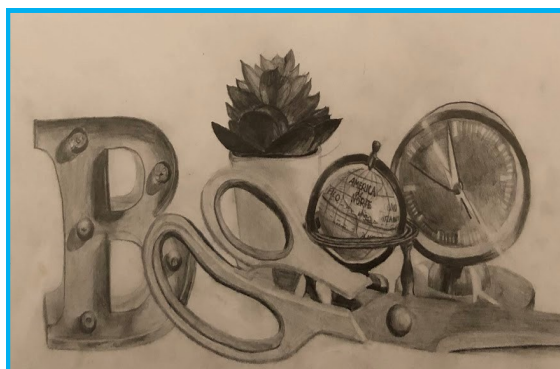
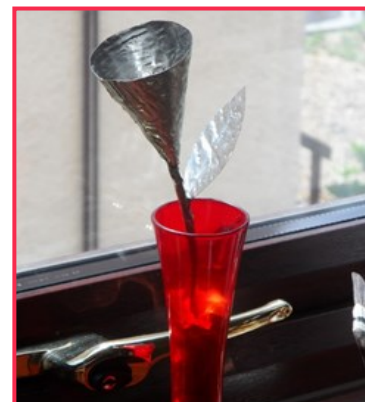
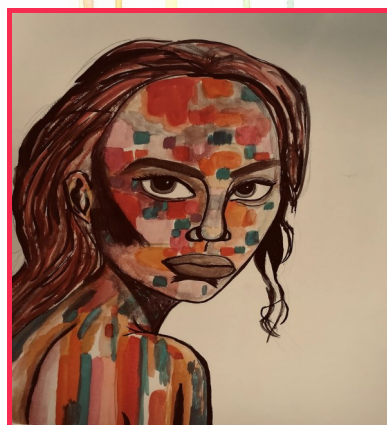


We are so impressed at the scale of the skull artwork Rowan has created. It takes real care and attention to create large scale artwork. Well done Rowan, we are extremely proud of you.

In School Provision



We have just started our last few weeks of Extra curricular activities for vulnerable students and those children of key workers. Students are having sessions in PE, Drama, Well-being and Meditation, DT and Music. Working towards their LORIC (leadership, organisation, resilience, initiative, communication) certification at the end of the term. We include a picture of the Music session taking place, students show our 'new normal', socially distanced lesson delivery. The students went to work in smaller groups to work on their song lyrics after a short masterclass session from Mr Andrews on song writing. Inspiration drawn from artists such as Adele and Take That. Ayd Perry in Year 10 kindly shared his song writing (Rap) work with the group. Great work Ayd!

Philosophy and Ethics

Year 9 students have been looking at the role of faith in films and considering whether films are the best way to teach Christianity.

The English Department are so proud of all the students that have entered the Creative Writing Competition. You have all put so much effort and thought into your stories. Well done!!



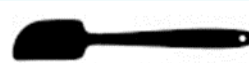
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DT Department



Students have been sending in pictures of their wonderful looking sweet and savoury bakes that they have been making at home. We include some tasty pictures below.



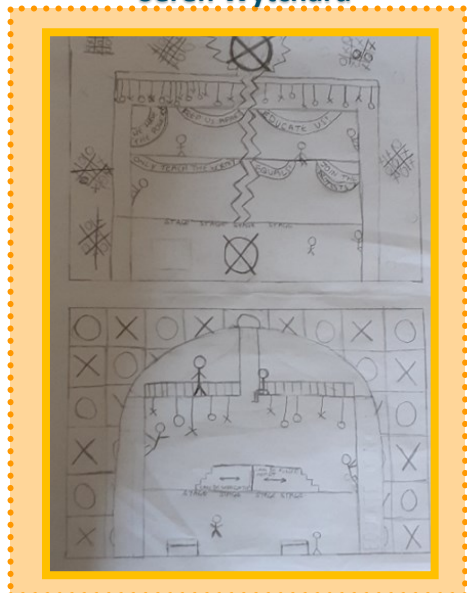


Drama Department

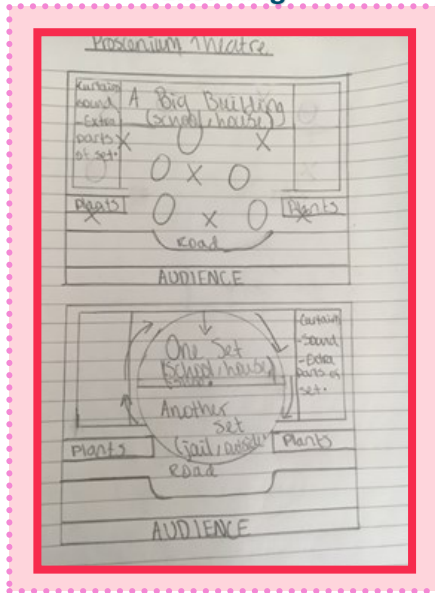

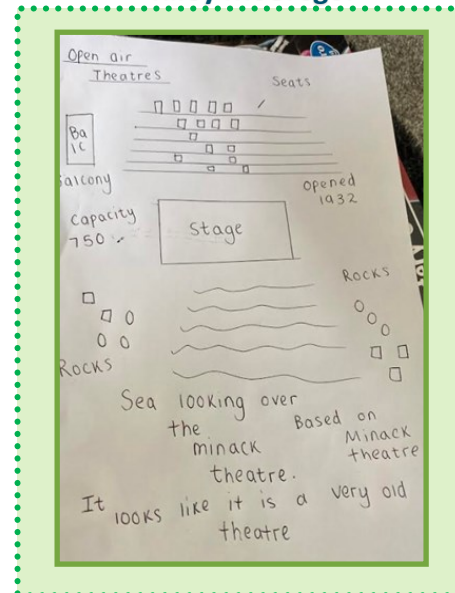

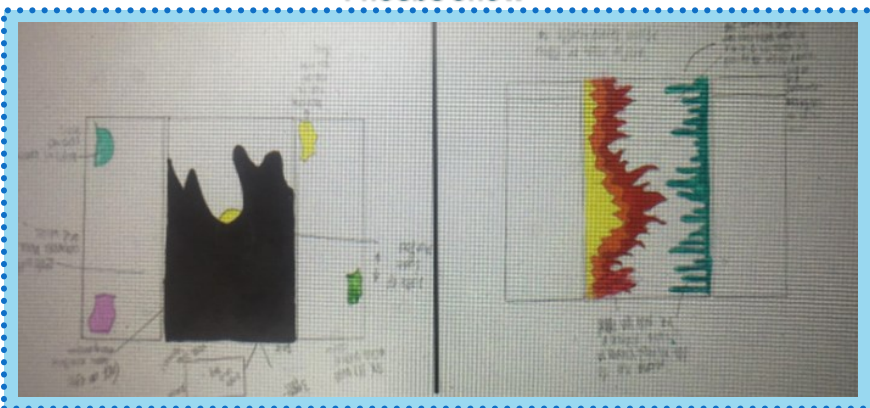

History Department



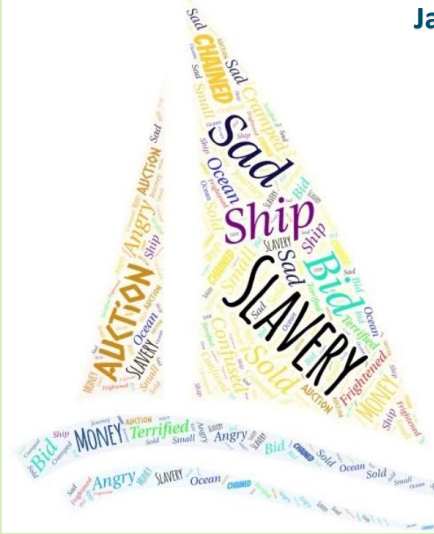
Year 8 History students were asked to create a wordscape to sum up the lives of slaves during the period of the transatlantic slave trade.

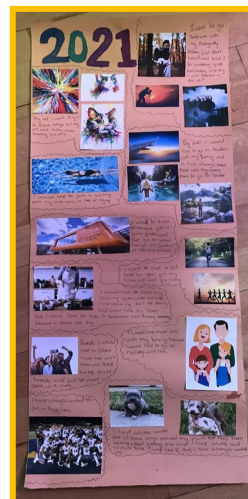


Mindful Meditation and Well-being

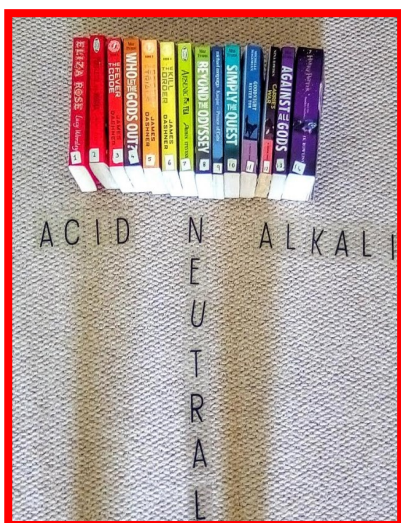

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Learning Resource Centre (LRC) News

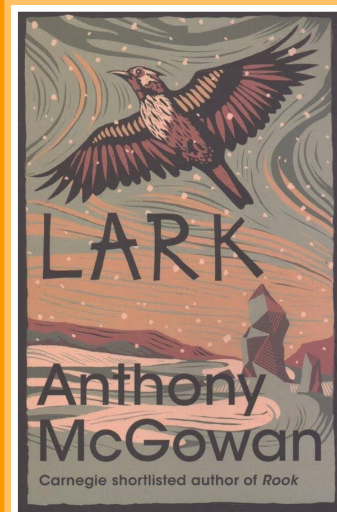

Year 12 Virtual Induction

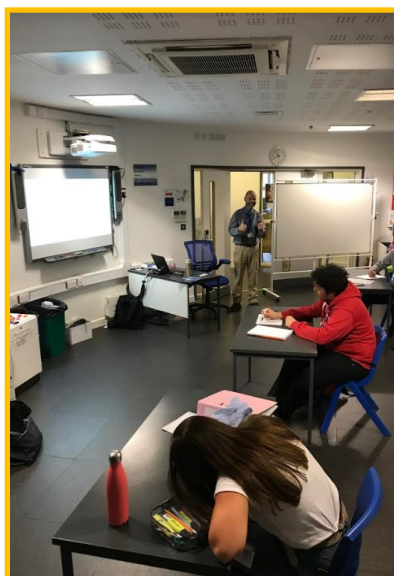
