## **What do I need to know or be able to do before taking this course?**

The best foundation for success in A Level Art is a good grade at GCSE.

This 2 year A level course builds on the skills, knowledge and understanding acquired by students who have taken Art at GCSE. A minimum grade of a 5 for both Art and English at GCSE is essential.

The A Level in Art requires high levels of self motivation and students must be prepared to work hard at developing abilities and commit time outside of taught lessons in order to succeed on the course.

## **What will I learn on the A Level course?**

Have you ever wondered why so many creative people are successful in many different walks of life?

Creativity isn't only about pursuing artistic interests, it can also open the door to exciting career opportunities for students and is a highly employable attribute in all walks of life.

Through A Level Art and Design, you will develop and stimulate your creativity through a broad and exciting course. Students explore a range of different media, processes or techniques, ensuring that there is something suitable for all interests. You will develop your ability to appreciate the visual world and to respond in a creative and personal way, expanding your imaginative and creative powers, your experimental, analytical and documenting skills. You will also develop a specialist vocabulary, knowledge and an understanding of the place of art and design in history and in contemporary society.

## **What kind of student is this course suitable for?**

This course will appeal to students who wish to undertake further studies in Art & Design, usually at a College or University.

Students who are looking to take up careers for which an art background is relevant; these might include animation, archaeology, architecture, advertising, fashion, film, photography, graphic design, museums, theatre, gallery work and web design to name but a few.

Students who simply enjoy and have an interest in Art, along with a good aptitude, but who do not intend to take the subject beyond the A Level are also welcome.

To make the most of the course students must be hardworking, self-motivated and committed.

## **What is covered on the A level course?**

### **The A Level specification has 2 units:**

**Component 1: Personal Investigation** - A personal investigation in which candidates develop work in response to an idea, issue, concept or theme of their choosing. This includes 3000 word written element with practical outcomes.

Assessment Weighting: 60% of total A Level marks

**Component 2: Externally-Set Assignment** - Externally set examination project from AQA. Students choose one title from a selection of given starting points.

Externally set Assessment Weighting: 40% of total A Level marks

In Year 12 students undertake a 'foundation level' style of course, in which they return to skills and media first taught through GCSE, and are introduced to new skills and methods of working in preparation for the standards expected in Year 13.

### **Types of Activities**

The AQA Specification encourages a broad approach, which allows candidates to develop a sound grounding in a number of media areas while still exploring the subject in depth.

### **What could I go on to do at the end of my course?**

There are many careers in Art & Design. Most of these require further study at an Art School, Further Education College or University. At present most students wishing to take art further will go on to do a one year Foundation Course at an Art College or apply for a degree courses on more specialist areas of art and design.

You might wish to go into a job where it is useful to have had experience of art and design, or where you will need to use some of the skills developed during this course. The study of art can also help you develop transferable skills you can take into any career or job.
