A Message From The Headteacher

Dear Parents / Carers and Students

What a challenging time we have all had since our last newsletter was published. I feel that we have all been buffeted and battered, but I must say that our community has been extraordinary in the way in which it has dealt with the challenges and how it has been so supportive.

Several major and unusual events have affected the normal day to day experience of school. We have had the significant tragedy of a young person losing their life and the immense impact that it has had on everyone. I was so proud of our students when they marked the memory of Josh Hall in such a dignified manner. The community was also incredibly supportive and sensitive. Thank you. We have had three positive covid cases and had to step back from our relaxation of the preventative measures in school. The students have observed those rules in an excellent way, too. Looking at the national announcements, we are more confident that the easing of these measures is possible. We will update you with our thinking once we have determined the safest way forward. We have also had the TAGs - teacher assessed grades - process to complete. This has become incredibly onerous as each school has to demonstrate fairness in a rigorous system which is evidenced at every opportunity. Students in Years 11 and 13 have had to sit "high level assessments" of late, to ensure that they have had the opportunity to show their abilities under rigorous rules. Those assessments, as well as others throughout the year, have to be assessed, checked and then moderated across departments to ensure that everything is fair and above board.

Throughout all of this, you have supported us and sent us kind words as well as flowers, biscuits, gifts and even chocolate bunnies for the students (that went down well!). We are all so grateful for your kindness. I cannot think of a better demonstration of why our community is outstanding. Our vision is that 'everyone matters'. Your kindness has shown that everyone does matter and that you care as passionately as we do to fulfil that vision. Thank you.

Accelerated Reader Programme



Rednock School has recently committed to making the literacy of our pupils the main driver of the school's efforts for the next 3 years.

In committing to a very significant investment of in excess of £25,000 in a new literacy scheme, the school hopes to not only improve students' literacy skills and therefore examination results, but to see the benefits in more confident young people joining the workforce, who are not held back by limited reading ability.



Our aspiration is that local employers will see the benefit of our decision in the young people they employ over the next 5 years, whatever roles these young people take on. The ability to read confidently means that written instructions, workplace health and safety policies, even information about employee pension arrangements, can be better understood, which will all contribute to improvements in productivity.

We are asking for your help with this.

The financial commitment that the school has made will enable us to embed literacy skills right across the school syllabus, so that whatever subject our young people are studying, there is an emphasis on developing their literacy



skills. But we are in desperate need of books! We are identifying suitable books to provide to young people to encourage them to read more regularly, and to eventually gain enjoyment from reading.

We have set a target of 2,000 books, for which we are allocating an average cost of £10 per book. We would like to ask you if you would be prepared to make a financial contribution to this effort. You will see the benefits of your contribution as you recruit young people to your workforce in the future. And given that you are spending for the purpose of improving your future pool of talent, the amount you pay will be deductible from your profits for tax purposes!

Every book that you sponsor will include a recognition of the support of your business through a sticker inside the front cover. All the world's a stage Shakespeare once said Acting out dramatic scenes Bringing alive characters in your head Playing heroes, heroines, kings and queens


Sitting in the theatre in complete dark Getting ready for the play to begin Thinking about what tale is about to embark And who might battle, die or win


Drama, an ancient art Embracing the past and looking forward to the future
