

Chemistry Week

Every year the Royal Society of Chemistry has a Chemistry week, and this year's was timed to coincide with the COP-26 climate summit in Glasgow. Students learnt about COP-26 and the potentially catastrophic effects of climate change that could occur within their lifetimes, should greenhouse gas emissions not be curbed. They had the opportunity to participate in the #promisetotheplanet initiative, and wrote their promises to the planet on leaves, which we have put up onto a Rednock tree of promises.



Raising Standard Lead

Year 9 | Mr Szmaglik - Term 2 has seen the re-launch of Champions League for this year. The first few weeks have seen Looping Lamas (Ellie Bick and Holly Yates) win two back to back 'Weekly Wins'. Some of the standout goals have been scored by Keeley Smith who is really pushing herself in lessons by reaching the extension materials, especially in Maths with Mr Qureshi. Mckenzie Hall has demonstrated great resilience in Maths with Mr Stewart. A huge well done to them both and the other participants!

Accelerated Reader+ has also been launched this term with help from Miss Benneyworth and a small group of Year 9's, who have been reading away in order to improve their literacy and develop a greater love for reading. As students begin to understand which types of texts excite and engage them, Ms Gillies will be looking to order in more books as necessary. It has been a real joy to help students find books that capture their imagination and allow them to really get lost in a book.

At the time of writing, Year 9 have amassed over 10,000 reward points this academic year already. Could we make 50,000 by the end of the year? At this rate, quite possibly!

Year 10 | **Mr Steele** - This term, Year 10 have been continuing to 'work smarter' and have started to focus on setting goals for themselves. It has been interesting to see some of the goals set and the challenges in completing them. Students taking part in small intervention groups have been asked to set SMART goals. These should be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Timely for them.

With goal setting, we are aiming to reach a point of habitual, intrinsic, motivation; for students, having a relevant goal that they came up with themselves is really important. After a couple of weeks of practice students have started to set goals which are relevant and achievable for them. Hopefully, once students have turned this process into a habit they can begin to make their goals more ambitious. At this stage, any discussions around students' short, medium and long term goals at home would also be really valuable.



Modern Foreign Languages



Over the last term, students in 9R3 have been learning how to run a café, in Spanish. The class has learned how to order food and drink, how to be part of the waiting staff and even how to prepare some Spanish dishes.

The students wrote to Mr Alexander to ask permission to run a Spanish café for their family. 9R3 then invited their family members into School to order food and drink from the Spanish café. Some students supported family members in ordering food and drink in Spanish and others waited on tables.

Well done Year 9, you did a fantastic job running the Spanish café and showing of your language skills.



















Drama Department



Ms Johnson's Year 9 class are looking at The Hillsborough disaster as part of the "Issues" scheme of work. The students learnt about the horrific events that occurred during 1989. The students worked in groups to create freeze frames of the tragedy.







Ms Johnson's Year 8 class acted out the Greek Chorus from 'The Medea'. The class used choral speech, canon, solo speech, gesture, a mask and choral movement to demonstrate this genre that we have been studying this term. Well done Year 8!







As part of the Unit 19 Acting Styles exam, Year 13 students acted 'Blue Remembered Hills' by Dennis Potter. This deceptively simple tale relates the activities of seven English children on a summer afternoon during World War II. In the woods, and a field they play, fight, fantasize and swagger. Their aggressions, fears, hostilities and rivalries are a microcosm of adult interaction.

It was great to be back in the drama studio with this exam and to have the support of everyone's families as a "masked" audience. It was a brilliant evening and the performances were outstanding.
