Dear Parents / Carers and Students,

We have seen a big rise in the number of students and staff experiencing Covid infections and the subsequent necessary absences this term which has meant that it has been a difficult time for all of us. I do hope that those of you who have had Covid are better.

Whilst that has been going on, we have tried to continue normal lessons and our return to expectations which I discussed with you in one of my videos. I am delighted to say that the students have been fantastic in adhering to these expectations; it has meant that the school is calm, purposeful and focused on learning. It feels as though we have weathered the storm and moved on (fingers crossed!).

Our extra curricular activities are up and running as smooth as we can. We believe that these activities are so important to the education and well being of the students; they enrich the lives of the students; provide character building skills and lessons for life. English Department



Name of Book: The 1,000 year old boy

Author: Ross Welford

Summary: Alfie Monk may seem like an ordinary 11 year old but he is actually over 1,000 years old and destined to live forever. When everything Alfie knows and loves is destroyed in a fire, the modern world comes crashing in. Alfie embarks on a mission to ensure that he will finally die and grow up like a normal boy.

Why should I read this book?: This book is very entertaining and has lots of humour in it. The main character Alfie Monk is a complex and interesting character who you can connect to. His story engages you and intrigues you to know whether he really can become 'normal' and grow up like any other boy.

We have also purchased 4 Raspberry Pi's, which we are hoping to get set up and working as soon as possible. A Raspberry Pi is a low cost, credit-card sized computer that plugs into a computer monitor or TV, and uses a standard keyboard and mouse. It is a capable little device that enables students to explore computing, and learn how to program in languages like Scratch and Python. Initially these will be available during the Key Stage 3 lunchtime club with Ms Clements on Wednesdays.

settled by a superb solo goal by



On Tuesday 15th and Wednesday 16th February, Mr Bruff, who has a YouTube channel dedicated to helping students with their GCSE English, visited Rednock School to teach our Year 11 students. Students were given a masterclass on Language Paper 1 that will help prepare them for their PPEs in Term 4.

Some feedback from the students were:

He was 'really helpful - cleared up things for me.' Another student commented that 'he presented a different way to look at the language mock', with another in agreement saying that 'he showed me new perspectives on the questions' and he was 'inspirational'. One student stated that 'he gave very helpful example responses, which were extremely useful to get an understanding of the level of detail and depth I need to complete the questions'.

Year 9 | Mr Szmaglik - Despite this term being the shortest so far, we have already seen so many successes in Year 9, which is reflected in the 16,000+ reward points which they've amassed so far this academic year. A special mention goes to the following students, who are among those who have achieved over 100 reward points: Holly Yates (145), Riley Woolams (134), Kianna Welsh (111), Bronwyn Walker (105) and Tyler Titheridge (101).

Champions League teams have continued to work hard towards securing the win each week. 'Looping Lamas' (Holly Yates and Ellie Bick) seem to be a dependable bet for a weekly win, however 'Samurai Sausages' (Levi Perry and Mckenzie Hall) and 'Dr Pepper' (Riley Woolams and Blake Creamer) have managed to topple them recently! We have had a variety of students as 'Player of the Week' this term, including Riley Woolams, Mckenzie Hall and Leiland Green - well done to all of them!

Accelerated Reader+ (AR+) has continued to thrive, with most students having now found their genre or author that makes them want to pick up a book. Of note is the progress of **Sophie King**, who elicited that she had really enjoyed reading a book by Evie Ainsworth. With some help from Ms Gillies, our school librarian, who put some novels by this author aside for Sophie, she has been able to enjoy picking up a book much more often. **Ashlee Smith** also benefited from a trip to the Learning Resource Centre where we were able to pinpoint that her favourite genre was Thrillers and find some of these within her zone of proximal development (ZPD) range.

Thanks to Mr Mitchell, many students have been working hard to improve and secure their understanding of key concepts, ready for GCSE. Mr Mitchell has been running interventions during am registration and it's been excellent to watch students seize this opportunity, taking full advantage of it. Year 10 | Mr Steele - Despite the continuing strain the pandemic has put on students, Year 10 have been working hard to recover. Thirty Year 10 students have commenced tutoring sessions with <u>MyTutor</u>, giving them access to university students who have recently passed (and excelled) in their GCSEs and A Levels. These sessions are ongoing over 15 weeks and for those students that have really bought into the programme, they are a powerful learning tool that has the potential to improve attainment by one whole grade on average in the subjects taken. While the tutoring sessions are a huge positive to come out of the pandemic, attendance has, unfortunately, been an issue throughout. As we move out of national restrictions, we are now beginning to see some progress in attendance for some students in Year 10. In order to continue on this trajectory, we recognise the need to work in conjunction with parents / carers to support this improvement. As a result, I will be taking every opportunity (this newsletter included!) to remind everyone how important attendance has always been, and especially now for the recovery process. At 95% attendance (the national average pre-pandemic) ten whole days of school are missed in a year, or 50 lessons! Over 5 years this adds up to a quarter of a whole school year being lost. When we consider the cost and commitment required to put thirty students through the MyTutor programme which totals 15 hours over the 15 weeks, it becomes increasingly clear that the most effective course of action is to get students into school on a daily basis. I would like, then, to encourage all students and parents / carers to make sure students are in school as much as is humanly possible as we move forward, and to say thank you in advance for everyone's efforts here!





To end on a positive, students in Year 10 have now amassed over 10500 achievement points this year. Special mentions must go to the following, who have all earned over 100 points: Austyn Cole (100), Callum Darlow (126), Dan Eavis (101), Sophie Miles (104), Amber Morgan (117), Ethan Oakey (100), Brandon Thomas (114) and Bethany Wilmott (101). There are also many students in the 90s who I will be writing about next time! This just goes to show that students are making it into school and are giving their best every single day. For this, as a whole staff body, we are utterly thankful.

Year 11 | Miss Jones - Year 11 were presented with their 'Mock' GCSE results on Thursday 20th January. It was great to see so many excited faces. Students were then briefed on their next steps for success this summer. Year 10 and 11 students are starting tutoring in Maths and English from Monday 24th January.




Learning Resource Centre
