Dear Parents / Carers and Students

We are now nearing the end of Term 5 - it has all gone so quickly this year! With just one term left, there is so much to do in preparation for a return to a "normal" year with all of our routines re-established. We are busily ensuring that the start to next year is as smooth as it can be for the students. Our transition days for the new intake of future Year 7 students is already planned as well as the building projects being completed for the new academic year. Exciting times!

Term 5 has seen Year 11 and Year 13 begin their examinations - the first ones for two years. We have held special briefings surrounding examinations as well as the usual revision sessions. Science Department





Eco News



Students at Rednock have been busy helping to set up a project to look at the impact of grounds management on the biodiversity of the invertebrates on the school grounds. This involves sampling the populations at a managed, and an unmanaged area that is left uncut in Term 6 to see how quickly insect populations may recover.



The work with Year 12 has been led by Kathy Meakin, a local professional ecologist with support from Western Power Distribution. We would like to thank Kathy for coming in and running this initiative with Year 12.







Slow worm

As well as sampling the invertebrate population we have been looking for slow worms on site and were delighted to find two in the first two days. They stay still when you first find them, but then they shoot off very quickly. A great find, well done Year 12!

A colourful cheat

This lovely beetle was found on some brambles at the front of the school. It looks like a wasp to fool its predators, but didn't fool us (it has no wings). The wasp beetle (Clytus arietis) has a fairly involved life cycle needing deadwood as a larva, but flower pollen as an adult. If the habitat doesn't

have both it unfortunately can't survive.

Learning Resource Centre





Duke of Edinburgh (DofE): May Update

We are delighted to have so many students on board with the DofE Programmes this year. 26 Year 11 students are taking part in the Silver DofE Programme and 42 Year 10 students are taking part in the Bronze Programme. Completing a Duke of Edinburgh Award is a fantastic opportunity that allows students to continue current activities or learn new skills as part of the physical recreation, skills and volunteering sections of the award.



<u>Physical Recreation:</u> DofE encourages participants to learn a new skill, or show progress in one in which they are already involved in. Rednock students are taking part in a range of traditional sporting activities such as; football, rugby and cricket. In addition, the students have pushed themselves to try new sports including; archery, kickboxing, tennis, ballet and sword fighting!

<u>Volunteering:</u> A big part of the DofE Programme is to volunteer and help the local community. It's been a real pleasure to see so many of our Rednock students relish in this opportunity and help our local community in so many ways. Some students are volunteering in charity shops, litter picking, helping in Scouts and Cubs along with coaching and refereeing in local sports clubs. By doing this the students have gained essential skills and attributes for work and



life such as resilience, problem-solving, team-working, communication and drive.

<u>Skills:</u> The students have picked up a huge range of skills, some have challenged themselves to learn Italian, train as a lifeguard and take part in dog training. Due to Covid-19 restrictions, many of the students are maximising opportunities through online resources, such as; learning sign language, gaining a certificate in sustainable future and

sewing.

Bronze Training Evening: It was great the see such high attendance at the Bronze training evening, which was run by Ocean Rock. Ocean Rock are an experienced adventure company who lead expeditions throughout the UK. The group learnt to map read, pack a backpack and find out what essential food to take with them. The training day for the Silver award is taking place on 9th of June.

Raising Standard Leaders

Year 8 - Mrs Mould

Term 5 is our shortest term but Year 8 has hit the ground running with interventions being actively taken up by the students and a large number of reward points being achieved, which is fantastic.

This term the school as a collective has been focusing on 'failure' as a key term and how we can overcome failure and drive ourselves forward to achieve our goals. For many students some of their goals may be things that at first seem out of reach. The message we are trying to give to the students is how we can all fail but what we do afterwards is what is important. If we really want that goal then we need to persevere, removing the obstacles preventing us from successfully reaching it and to focus on how enjoyable success will be in the end.

The most important thing to remember is "The world is full of successful failures" we all learn from failure but if we take this failure and try again and succeed, we can become all the better based on what we have learnt along the way. As a school we believe this is a really important message and it would be great if you were able to find the time to discuss this with your child to reinforce this message.

Year 9 - Mr Szmaglik

Term 5 has been an extremely short, but intensive term. At the tail end of Term 4, Year 9 embarked on their Options process and I was taken aback by the maturity and depth of the discussion that myself and Mr Cheeseman were fortunate enough to have with students.

Our focus for Term 5 was failure; or rather the necessity of failure in order to be successful. Staff at Rednock opened up to students via video about their own failures and what they had learnt from them during an assembly. Our ambition was to normalise failure for students and see it as a potential asset to helping you succeed, not a drawback, nor a weakness.

Accelerated Reader+ continues to thrive with Gracie Pitts reading a signed copy of her book, and Ellie Bick and Georgina Freier concurrently reading the same novel, again written in verse!

Students have continued to work extremely hard with Mr Mitchell in Maths intervention on Tuesdays. This term they have worked on rearranging formulas, ratios and angles. There has been particularly excellent attendance and effort from Gio Bailey, Lily Herbert, Poppy Jones, Sophie King and Charlotte King. Well done!

Year 10 - Mr Steele

Failure is our keyword for Term 5! The rationale behind this is to encourage students to understand that failure and struggle are a normal part of life - to be embraced and to help drive positive future change. For me the most important message here is that students try things, and that they try them often. Whether they succeed or fail, at this point in their lives every experience is helping to shape their understanding of the world.

Some students are already living this message, which is excellent. We have recently had two groups of students go through a Prospects Training course on resilience and grit with a view to trying to improve their attendance. Looking back at the data this has been successful in all cases so far. If you think your child might need support in boosting their attendance please do let me know as there is the possibility of putting one more round of students through the course before they finish Year 10 - richard.steele@rednockschool.org.uk
