We love the written word here at Rednock and we like to encourage our students to read a variety of genres and styles of book.



The competition for an individual winner continues on Tuesday 7th May.




Royal Windsor Horse Show




Year 12 trip to Oxford


Be More Like Batman...

A Message From The LRC

Reading is good for you - and <u>here's the proof</u>! Research by the National Literacy Trust (2018,) and supported by the NHS, shows that 'children who enjoy reading are 3 times more likely to have high levels of mental wellbeing compared to those who do not'.

According to a study by the University of Sussex (2009), silently reading for just 6 minutes reduces stress levels by 68% - that's more than listening to music, having a cup of tea or going for a walk!

Alcohol Dependence Awarness

Alcohol dependence, which is also known as alcoholism or alcohol addiction, describes the most serious form of high-risk drinking, with a strong - often uncontrollable - desire to drink. To help approach this difficult subject, Mr Cole welcomed a guest speaker into one of his Year 11 Life Skills classes.

Rach Goatman visited to talk of her personal experience with the challenges of alcohol addiction. The students were able to ask many questions to better understand the condition and possibly take away a new view on the topic.







School Tour Opportunities

Year 12 Physicists and Chemists were lucky enough to visit Oldbury Nuclear power station recently; we were the first public visit in almost 20 years!

We found out about the safety issues while visiting a power station and how we, and their workers, are kept safe. We learnt about the history, it ran as a nuclear power station for 44 years and shut down in 2012. It was really interactive and informative to find out how they are now decommissioning the site and how it will take upto at least 2080.

We found out about nuclear engineering, health physics, civil engineering, security work and the decommissioning process. The apprenticeship talks were really interesting, they take on apprentices post GCSEs and as degree apprentices post A level. One student commented that "the fact that they are a viable option instead of going to university has made me consider them as an option".

The tour of the site was amazing and eerie, some buildings have been flattened but the main reactor buildings (now empty of fuel) are mostly untouched at this point. We really enjoyed scanning each other with security wands and all of the PPE we had to wear/carry to enter the site: steel toe capped shoes, safety glasses, gloves, hard hats, ear defenders and a high viz jacket. As we left the reactor area we all had to be checked for radioactive contamination and then our personal radiation detector had to be registered. A few of us had managed to avoid all radiation, the most was 5mSv, this is less than a chest CT scan!

Dyslexia Intervention Project


