The students that took part this year were joined by their instructor, Stuart. All students involved really enjoyed their sessions and came away with new confidence and skills. They were looking forward to using their new knowledge on the road.

Year 7 Skills Based Curriculum

Year 7 students have been enthusiastically engaging in learning basic life-saving first aid, an invaluable skill set that includes CPR training. As part of their Skills Based Curriculum lesson, they practiced chest compressions on Resusci dolls, allowing them to gain hands-on experience in a safe and controlled environment. This practical approach not only enhances their understanding of emergency procedures but also builds their confidence in handling real-life situations. The dedication and focus shown by the students highlights the importance of these essential skills, preparing them to respond effectively in critical moments and potentially save lives.

Cardiff University Trip

The Year 12 English Literature students were extremely lucky to be invited to Cardiff University's first ENCAP Outreach Day on 4th June.

Miss Taylor and Ms Smith travelled with the students on the train, using the journey to talk about their own experiences of university study and things to consider when choosing an institution. When we arrived, we had a fascinating introduction to university study from Dr Meredith Miller, who is an author and lecturer engaged in high quality research at Cardiff, which is a Russell Group university.

The students were able to choose between Philosophy, Linguistics and Creative writing for their first break out session. Robin and Jamie were asked to complete a free writing exercise and Jamie shared her amazing piece about the train journey to Cardiff. The Philosophy session was equally fantastic, really enthusing Charlie, Grace and Jayson. Next was a tour around campus with a current second year student who shared some extremely useful and practical information from a student's perspective.

After a lunch spent chatting with current students, Dr Miller and Dr Gilchrist talked to us about their own route into academia and gave us an excellent insight into their research, including some great tips that the students can use for their A Level in English Literature.

We completed the day with a quick introduction to Cardiff as a city, to demonstrate the benefits of choosing a university in a bustling metropolis. Miss Taylor and Ms Smith were particularly impressed with our students who joined in with every activity and made the most of this fantastic experience. As ever, we are so proud of you.

Primary School Activities Day






Exploring Technician Roles

From 10th June, Year 10 left and right populations will take it in turns to head out for a week's work experience (watch this space for stories of what they got up to!). For the week that they are not on work experience, they will be taking part in an innovative new programme from the national STEM centre: the technician's programme. The aim is to open students' eyes to the vast range of



different technician jobs that are available, and for them to experience the kinds of work that technicians do. Throughout the week, students will take part in lessons across a range of subjects, for example, exploring what it takes to design and test batteries for electric cars, or to write music tracks for computer games. The programme is currently in its pilot phase nationally, and Rednock is really innovating by exploring how we can offer an experience like this to an entire cohort of students.



Student Success

During half term, Harry Phillips, Year 10, completed the Yorkshire Three Peaks challenge which involved hiking 23 miles over Pen Y Ghent, Whernside and Ingleborough, the three highest peaks in Yorkshire. He was raising money for Little Hero, a charity which supports families affected by childhood cancer (www.littlehero.org.uk).

Monmouth Maths Challenge

On the 6th of July Leo, Lydia, Rosanna and Morgan attended the UKMT Team Maths Challenge, held at Monmouth School for Girls. This is the first time the annual competition has taken place since before the pandemic and with little time for preparation the team performed spectacularly. There were four rounds: The first being a general selection of maths questions that were answered collaboratively within groups. Round 2 consisted of a cross-number where one pair in the team had the 'across' clues and the other pair had the 'down' clues. Round 3 was a shuttle round, where again working in pairs the students passed their answer from their question across so that pair two could answer theirs. Finally, round 4 was a relay round,

where one group could not access their question until the other had completed theirs correctly, and so on.

The room was filled with teams from private schools and grammar schools and so it was with a sense of pride and achievement that we came 13th out of 20 teams.

The students were fabulous and gave their all in every round. A teacher from another school who was allocated to facilitate their rounds sought me out to comment on how well they conducted themselves and the effort they put in. I felt extremely proud of them for representing Rednock School and look forward to next years competition.

Immunisation Update

We have been informed by the NHS Immunisation Team that they're introducing a new way for parents and carers to consent to their child's school-aged vaccinations. The consent process this coming Academic year will be completed using an electronic system called Cinnamon.


As of 1st August 2024, Gloucestershire Health and Care NHS Foundation Trust will have successfully digitised all school vaccination programmes. Rollout will commence early September 2024, starting with the National Flu Programme, which will be delivered to all school-aged children and young people from Reception up to and including Year 11 in mainstream schools.

Important Updates from Rednock School

Changes to the School Day from September 2024

Why is the school day changing?

The Department for Education expects all mainstream, state-funded schools to provide a 32.5-hour week (or 6.5-hour days) by September 2024. As a local authority, maintained school we must adhere to this. Currently at Rednock, we do not fulfil this requirement. Our current school day is short by 10 minutes.

What counts towards the school day?

The time from the official start of the school day (morning registration), to the official end of the school day for all students (official home time). It includes breaks, lunch, teaching time and any enrichment activities that students are expected to attend. It doesn't include optional before or after school provision.

The 32.5-hour week is not a requirement of 16-19 provision.

What does this mean for September 2024?

From September 2024 our school day will end at 3.10pm

How will the additional time be used?

The additional 10 minutes will be used to extend morning break and to introduce an afternoon registration slot after lunch.

How might this impact my child?

We have explored many different approaches on how to use the additional 10 minutes and believe that the model chosen will have a positive impact on our school. The longer morning break will benefit students and staff, and the after-lunch registration will ensure students are best prepared for a successful period 5, whilst providing directed time to carry out our legal obligation to conduct an afternoon registration.

We have consulted with our school transport company who supports our model, meaning there will be no impact on those students catching a bus.

Dyslexia Intervention Project - Celebration day!

The students who participated in the pilot for a bespoke dyslexia intervention, met with their parents to celebrate their resilience and hard work over the past 20 weeks. The creators of the intervention - Georgia Niolaki and Aris Terzopoulos from Bath Spa University - congratulated them for their progress and their deeper understanding of themselves as dyslexic learners. They thanked them for their commitment and insightful feedback that will help not only themselves, but other dyslexic students in the future.

Will Tull gave this very thoughtful feedback on the intervention:

"I think that this dyslexia intervention has really helped me to relearn all the things that have slowly drifted out of memory. I loved the pattern of sessions and how we had visual timetables at the start of every session. The wide range of different rules and learning strategies really helped. I particularly liked how we had spelling and reading cards to help us build on our reading and spelling skills. Also, I think that using books was very helpful as we had all learning resources in one place. I feel like I have learnt at least 5 things and much more from these sessions. The games really helped to wrap up what we had been learning each season. The concept cards really helped to drill the key ideas into my head which was good. I loved how we picked up on small things that I would have never noticed, an example would be the highlighting and how much you don't realise you highlight. All in all, I think this intervention was a great success and I'd love to see it being done to help others who may struggle with dyslexia."

The students were given a certificate and a generous Amazon voucher to spend on whatever they wanted! So very well done to - Aiden, Mattia, Will, Lucas and Finley.

Also, last but not least - a BIG thank you to the Teaching Assistants - Miss Cooper, Miss Whitlock and Mrs Pagett, who put in the time and effort to not only learn about dyslexia themselves, but to share that knowledge in such an enjoyable way that the students learnt from it.

Moving forward, the knowledge learnt from participating in this study, will be put into mini schemes of work for Rednock staff to use in the classroom to support our dyslexic learners. Also, Gloucestershire Dyslexia Association will share the success of the pilot around the county.

Year 10 Softball




A fond Farewell
