Exploring Technician Roles

Over the last two weeks year 10 students have been introduced to a variety of technician careers. The sessions have been run across various departments helping students to make links between subjects. In each session students




were presented with a brief and stepped into their technician roles to come up with solutions. There was a range of teamwork and individual tasks required. This was part of a pilot scheme set up by STEM learning which aims to enthuse and inspire students to consider careers in STEM that they may not have heard of. Students spent time researching different technician careers followed by hands on experiences.

As **Gaming Audio Technicians** students were tasked with designing an audio soundtrack for a platformer video game.





As **Water Technicians** students conducted tests on a range of water samples to evaluate quality and find sources of contamination in a river system.





The **Lighting Technician** session involved designing a lighting rig for a theatrical production, students then constructed a 3D mock-up of the set using coloured lighting to create different moods for a play.

As **Food Technicians** students made bread and created a range of innovative new flavours which they then had to taste test.



In the **Battery Technician** session students made batteries from common household materials and used them to light LEDs.

Students have enjoyed the different style of lessons and some are now considering these types of careers. It has also been a great opportunity for staff to work with colleagues in other departments. A big thank you goes out to all staff involved in the organisation and delivery of these sessions - especially the technicians!

Geography Fieldwork Trip

Over the last two weeks 130 Rednock GCSE Geographers have descended upon Minehead in Somerset to investigate the coastal defences there. Whilst we were very lucky to dodge the predicted torrential rain last week, this week sunburn was more of an issue! The students measured the beach profile either side of one of the main groynes, and evaluated the success of these and other defences such as the sea wall, the rock armour and the beach nourishment using techniques such as bi-polar analysis. Fieldsketches were drawn and annotated and surveys of local opinion were conducted. The local economy was boosted through many purchases of fish and chips and even a few ice creams as our summer finally arrived! The students worked hard, making sense of their classroom learning in the real world, and were a credit to the school and to themselves.









Bus Shelter Upgrades

You may remember that we have been working with the local council to brighten up the bus shelters outside of the school. The students' artistic efforts have transformed the once drab and worn out structures into vibrant and welcoming spaces for the community. With brushes in hand and creativity in full swing, the students worked diligently to create colorful designs and uplifting scenes, adding a touch of beauty to the neighborhood. This project not only enhanced the aesthetic appeal of the bus shelters but also fostered a sense of community pride and collaboration. The students' dedication and hard work has left a lasting, positive impact on their surroundings, showcasing the power of youth involvement in community improvement.








Year 10 Work Experience

Legumes Project

Since May the Young Farmers group have been participating in a project with Southampton University and other schools to investigate alternative heat-tolerant crops and to determine their ability to grow and produce yield. Feeding the future will require more food than we currently grow, but in a changing climate. For the UK we expect hotter, drier summers, and more erratic rainfall, and these are conditions that negatively affect staple UK crops.


We were sent seeds from six legume plants – broad beans, dwarf beans, peas, chickpeas, lentils, lablab. These crops vary from adapted to the UK (broad beans, dwarf beans, and peas), possibly able to grow, especially in a warm year and/or in the South (chickpeas and lentils), and untested but adapted to hot and dry places, so more risky (lablab).

So far all of the bean species have germinated - we are now closely monitoring to see when they produce flowers, and hopefully some beans for us to eat!

This has been a great opportunity for students to participate in a citizen science project and who knows their data may be used to shape the future of sustainable agriculture in the UK.









Student Success

Bea Sprague represented Rednock in the County Athletics Championships at Blackbridge Jubilee Athletics Track on Saturday 8th June in the Shot Put event. Bea won the event with an enormous throw and a personal best of 9.1m. This meant that she qualified to compete in the South West Schools Athletics Championships in Exeter - an amazing achievement! Bea came 4th! We are extremely proud of Bea's achievement.



National Clean Air Day

As part of National Clean Air Day members of the school Eco group participated in an online chat called 'l'm a scientist, get me out of here'. They used the chat to find out more about how to monitor and improve air quality. The group were joined by 5 scientists, they asked all sorts of questions which will enable them to carry out scientific research. The students really enjoyed this opportunity - fantastic to have so many experts to quiz! They now have the information they need to carry out their research, with the option of booking another chat later in the term to discuss their findings.



Safeguarding Update

We want to bring your attention to the communication we have received from the Police urging parents to check the group WhatsApp settings on their children's phones. This comes following reports of a number of 11 year olds in Gloucestershire being exposed to sexually violent and racist content via the app.





Once in the group, which has an American phone number prefix, they are encouraged to add everyone in their contacts and are then sent upsetting sexually violent and racist content. Group members are then warned that if they leave the chat, they will be found. The Police are now asking parents whose children use WhatsApp to check the settings on the messaging app so that they cannot be added to groups by unknown third parties. The default setting in WhatsApp allows anyone to add a number to a group chat without needing permission.

To disable this, go to WhatsApp and follow these steps:

- Go to Settings
- · > Privacy
- · > Groups
- > Under 'who can add me to groups', select 'My contacts'

The Police also advise parents to talk to their children so that they do not view the chat if they have been added to the group and to block, delete and report the group to WhatsApp immediately.

If you have any concerns do not hesitate to get in touch with your child's tutor or any member of the safeguarding team.
