


Visit to Berlin









Rotary Club Young Photographer Competition








Year 8 STEM Event








Year 9 this term has been looking at Alternative Religious Beliefs. The assessment for this term based on this unit of work was to research one of the 4 main beliefs on offer or an alternative one of choice, agreed upon first with the teacher. The students were expected to research their chosen belief in their chosen groups, create a slideshow of information and film themselves presenting it just like a weather reporter. The results of all their hard work have been **phenomenal!** The premise behind this work is to show students that there are so many different worldviews, some more abstract than others but ultimately we are not all the same and it is important to be able to see alternative viewpoints by looking through other peoples lenses.

Sixth Form Enrichment Activities



STEM Visit To Rolls Royce Bristol

Seven Year 12 STEM students had the incredible opportunity to visit Rolls Royce in Bristol last week. This educational trip was organised as part of a workshop run by the Institute of Materials, Minerals, and Mining. The visit was not only an eye-opener but also an inspiring glimpse into the world of advanced engineering and materials science.



During the workshop, the students delved into the fascinating realm of materials used inside jet turbine engines. They engaged in hands-on activities involving non-destructive testing methods such as ultrasound, eddy current testing, 3D X-ray imaging, and penetrant dye testing. These activities provided invaluable insights into how engineers ensure the integrity and safety of critical components in aerospace applications.

One of the highlights of the visit was witnessing the manufacturing of turbine blades.
