Teaching and Learning Focus

A really important part of our offer at Rednock is our careers programme, which starts in Year 7 and runs all the way through to Year 13. Careers education has really changed over the last few years, and it is no longer solely focused on 'what you want to be when you grow up'; careers education is about so much more than that! Through a combination of tutor time activities, standalone careers lessons taught in the life skills programme, subject-specific lessons, trips, external speakers, workshops, 'go to work' days, work experience, enrichment days and assemblies, students learn about the vast range of different opportunities available to them in the wider world. They learn about different types of employment, career pathways, employment sectors, and the labour market in our local area. We also have a big focus on developing and identifying students' skills, as we know that employers are increasingly hiring on skills and attributes, not just qualifications alone.

A very important aspect of the careers programme is that it is delivered across the whole curriculum, as the more students know about the world around them, the more there is for them to aspire to. Every teacher at Rednock is a teacher of careers, and in every subject, students receive careers information. This might be a case study of someone working in a particular area, a careers information board linking the topics studied to different jobs, examples of how the skills students are learning will help them in later life, a talk from a professional, or a trip to a business in the local area. We are always looking to expand our offer at Rednock, and would be delighted to hear from you if you think you could contribute.

All subject areas also have display boards to inform students about careers related to that subject and to support the careers education delivered in lessons.



Cheltenham Literature Event

On Sunday 13th October six of our students won the opportunity to perform their own poetry at Cheltenham Literature Festival. Their poems were a result of two workshops run by a local poet who helped them curate and develop their work. The incredible event was hosted by Amnesty International and was centred around the idea of human rights, a topic which seems increasingly important today. Their performances were brilliant, inspiring and moving and they made all of Rednock very proud. A massive well done to **Rosie, Isla, Ruza, Amelia, Rosanna and Charlotte.**





Mobile Phones in School

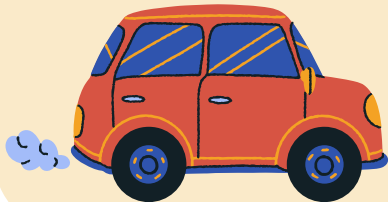
As we approach the half-term break, we'd like to remind parents, carers, and students that mobile phones are not permitted for use during school hours for students in Years 7-11. Phones should remain off and stored away from the first bell to the last bell of the school day unless students have been directed to use them by staff. Recently, we've noticed an increase in phone confiscations, so we feel this is a timely reminder of our policy.

There is growing concern around teenage social media use. Research increasingly links rising social media engagement with worsening mental health among young people. It's crucial that we, as educators, parents, and carers, are aware of the minimum age requirements for social media platforms. For example, teenagers must be at least 13 years old to use apps like Snapchat, Facebook, and Instagram, while WhatsApp has a minimum age requirement of 16.

This week, Josh MacAlister MP led a debate in Parliament on the Safer Phones Bill, which aims to make smartphones less addictive for children and to empower families and educators to reduce screen time. For those interested in learning more, the [NSPCC website](#) provides valuable guidance on managing social media use and its impact on young people.

We had some really good conversations around stigma and how this can impact mental health, and worked our way through different scenarios to practice our communication and listening skills, and to apply what we learnt in the training. Overall, the session was really fun and we learnt lots! We can't wait to start making a difference to our school communities as Community Connectors.

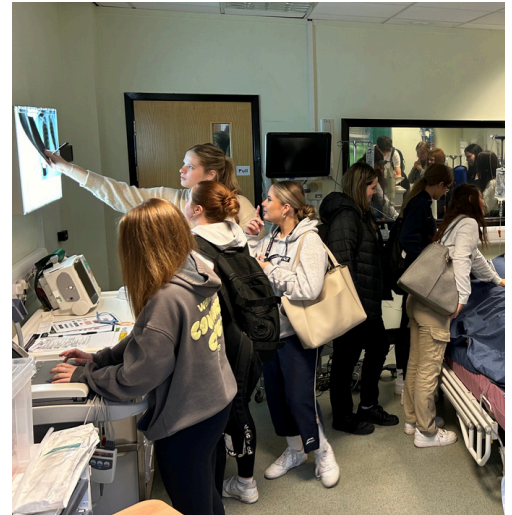




Y12 Trip to the University of South Wales

Year 12 Health and Social Care students visited the University of South Wales where they undertook a variety of different workshops using the skills they have learnt in lessons and applying them to a practical environment.

The students had the chance to embed their skills in the simulation centre, where they assessed different patients (mannequins) in different situations; one of the favourite cases was in the University's ICU simulator centre where the group worked together to read heart rate graphs, x rays and had to monitor the patient. One of the students explained, "the simulation centre was fascinating and the mannequins looked really real, this has really inspired me to study Health in the future". The students also had an experience in the midwifery suite and learnt about different careers in the health sector. It was a brilliant, informative and inspiring day.



Year 10 Health & Social Care

In their lessons, Year 10 Health and Social Care students have been recapping the development of infancy and childhood through the use of paint, specifically looking at fine and gross motor skills and how these skills grow through the ages of 0-8 years old.

Boost programme

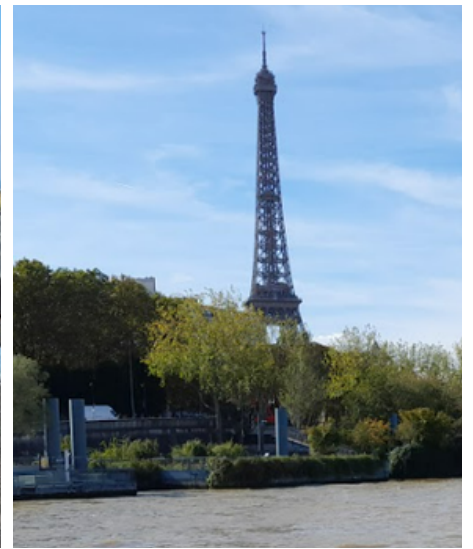
Last week representatives of Gloucestershire Police came into school to run their 'Boost' mental health program. On Tuesday they worked with the whole of Year 12, teaching them strategies for self-regulation and managing their mental health. Year 12 could then choose whether or not to participate further in the program by presenting to Year 7 students. On Thursday the Boost team were back in school preparing Year 12 for teaching the first session to Year 7. In groups of 3 or 4 they took a whole Year 7 class for an hour, explaining about self-regulation, teaching students what happens in the brain when we 'flip our lids' and then taking them outside on the field to demonstrate with bottles of cola. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves and Year 12 did an absolutely outstanding job and should feel very proud of what they achieved. Over the coming weeks, the Year 12 teams will teach two more lessons to Year 7 to complete the program.





Trip to Normandy and Paris

Earlier in October, we took 39 Rednock students to Normandy and Paris. After a 16-hour coach and ferry journey, with a brief stop in the beautiful town of Honfleur, we finally arrived at our Chateau near Bayeux. Highlights included: a trip to the Mont Saint Michel and visits to British, American and German Second World War cemeteries. Students also went to Bayeux market to take part in a team task: buy lunch for 5 euros per person and take it back to the Chateau for presentation and consumption. Then, after a final night of snail eating and disco dancing, we got up VERY early and headed to Paris for a trip up the Montparnasse Tower, lunch in a restaurant near the Arc de Triomphe, a boat excursion on the Seine and a brief visit to the Stade de France. With a final arrival time of 3:30am, the students returned exhausted but with fantastic memories, especially those who were making their first trip abroad. Here are some of the photo highlights.





Seville 2024

59 students and 5 staff members were lucky enough to be able to spend 4 days exploring the beautiful city of Seville last week. On Thursday we walked (and walked) and saw some of the city's most famous sites, such as the Parque María Luisa, the Torre de Oro and the Bullring.

On Friday, we visited the famous Real Alcázar and the Cathedral with its famous Giralda (bell tower). It is one of the largest cathedrals in the world and its bell tower was first built in 1198, when the site was a mosque before the Christian reconquest. We then went to sample traditional Spanish cuisine and to watch a Flamenco performance in the world's only museum dedicated to the artform. The artists were world class and the students were all very impressed!

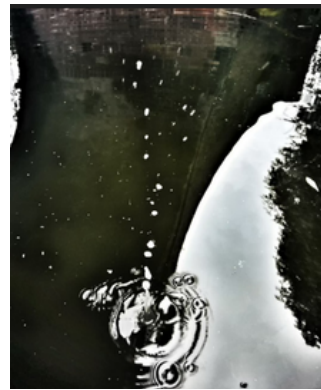
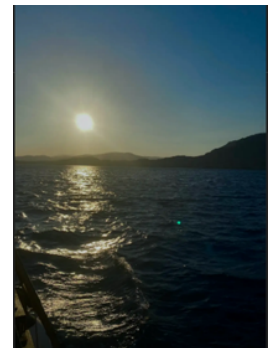
78,263 steps later and we were back home!





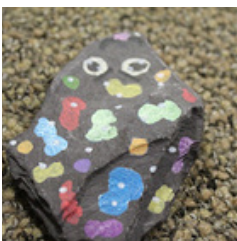
Year 10 Photography

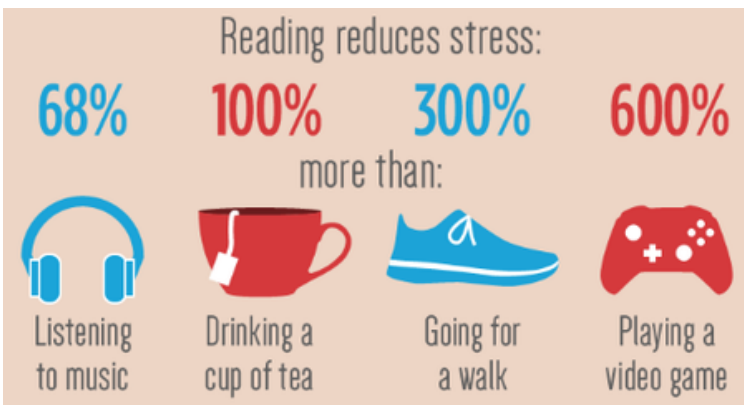
