Teaching and Learning Focus: Think-Pair-Share

Think-Pair-Share is a learning strategy where students think individually first about a question or issue, then discuss their ideas with a partner, and then finally share their thoughts with the whole class.







It is a strategy commonly used in the classroom as it has so many benefits. Firstly, it gives students time to process their own thoughts and gives them a chance to think for themselves. The second phase, where they discuss with a partner, allows further development of their initial ideas. The fact that they have to explain their thinking to someone else supports the work we are doing as a school on oracy, whilst the sharing process might reveal their misconceptions, or mistakes they might have made, which they can then address. The opportunity to share can also give them the confidence that their ideas are valid, which in turn encourages them to further develop and refine their thinking. This all means that by the time the teacher asks for responses as a whole class, students have had the peer support that has helped them to develop good responses that they have the confidence to share.



Attendance Update - Did you know?

92% attendance = 8% absence 8% absence = 17 days missed a school year

Research shows that students who miss 17 days per school year achieve at least 1 GCSE grade lower in all subjects, as well as the impact on the social aspects of school.

Punctuality counts!
30 mins late a day (for example, 5 mins late to morning registration and to each lesson) = 19 days missed a year!

Due to the impact of missing even this number of days, we refer to 90% attendance or less as 'persistent absence' What does this actually mean?

90% attendance = Missing half a day per week

90% attendance = Missing **20 days** per school year - **4 whole weeks**!!!

90% attendance = Missing 95 days (HALF A YEAR!!!) over Years 7-11.

Coming Soon to an App near you...

In Term 6, we will be moving our school information system from Edulink over to Class Charts. From September, this will also replace Satchel One, meaning you

only need one app to cover all the information you need about your child's progress. Nearer the time you will be sent login details and a user guide; but for now we wanted you to know that this was on its way to make our communication to you and your child better.







Smartphone Free Childhood

With growing research highlighting the impact of screen time and social media use among children, the school is currently reviewing its mobile phone policy ahead of next September.

As part of this process, the school was approached by an independent organisation called **Smartphone Free Childhood**. They are not affiliated with the school, but they aim to raise awareness around children's smartphone use and offer support to parents who are considering how their children engage with digital devices.

CanSat UK Competition

On Friday 4th April, a group of our students successfully launched model satellites by rocket at the Ministry of Defence's COTEC site in Wiltshire as part of the CanSat UK Competition.

Working in teams, the students designed, built, and tested miniature satellites — about the size of a drinks can. Their hard work culminated in a thrilling launch day where their satellites were rocketed hundreds of metres into the air, before parachuting back to Earth while collecting and transmitting realtime data to a ground station.







This exciting opportunity was part of the European Space Education Resource Office (ESERO-UK) initiative, which challenges young people to take on the role of real aerospace engineers and scientists. It provides an incredible hands-on STEM experience, blending physics, DT, computing, and teamwork.

We are incredibly proud of all participating students who will each receive the Silver Cadet Award for their efforts and achievements in this high-level engineering challenge.

Students Experience Life as Surgeons

On Saturday 22nd March, a group of our students had the incredible opportunity to take part in an immersive Dissection Lab event at Rednock School. This hands-on workshop allowed them to step into the shoes of medical professionals, gaining invaluable insight into anatomy through live dissections of various organs.



The morning session, Anatomy for Beginners, introduced KS4 students to the basics of surgical techniques. They scrubbed up, donned gloves, and learnt more about what it takes to be a surgeon.

In the afternoon, KS5 students were introduced to Advanced Anatomy, a more in-depth exploration of human physiology. This built on their knowledge from A-Level courses offering them a deeper understanding of organ, tissue, and cellular functions.





Beyond the scientific learning, the event was an opportunity for students to meet like-minded peers from other local schools. They worked collaboratively, supporting each other through the intricate dissection processes. Their enthusiasm, teamwork, and professionalism were a credit to the school.



Overall (despite the somewhat interesting odours at times), the day was a fantastic success, leaving students both inspired and more confident in their aspirations for the future. We look forward to offering similar opportunities again and supporting our students as they explore careers in science and healthcare.









Year 9 Students Experience Mind-Controlled Drones

Fifteen Year 9 students recently had the exciting opportunity to visit The King's School in Gloucester, where they explored cutting-edge technology with Nimbus, a company specialising in advanced drone systems.

One of the highlights of the trip was watching Thomas successfully control a drone using only the power of his mind. Wearing a specialised headset that detected brain signals, he was able to command the drone to take off and land without any physical input - just his thoughts alone!

This fascinating experience showcased the incredible advancements in science and technology being developed by local companies. Students were inspired by the real-world applications of this technology and left with a new appreciation for the future of scientific innovation.





Year 7 Design and Technology Students Complete 'Book of Illusions' Lighting Project

Students in DT have completed their Book of Illusions project, which involved designing and making lighting pieces that incorporate optical effects. The project encouraged students to explore how light, shadow, reflection, and materials interact to create visual illusions.


Each student developed a unique design, using different techniques to manipulate light and perception. Many projects incorporated reflection to enhance their effects, using polished surfaces and carefully positioned light sources to create depth and movement. The final pieces ranged from subtle shadow patterns to more complex illusions, demonstrating a mix of creativity and practical skills.

Year 12 Health & Social Care Students Visit UWE for Inspiring Workshop Day

Our Year 12 Health and Social Care students recently had the exciting opportunity to visit the University of the West of England (UWE) for an engaging and educational day of workshops. This special trip gave students a hands-on insight into a variety of health and social care careers, deepening their understanding of the subjects they study in class.

Throughout the day, students rotated through a series of interactive sessions led by professionals and university staff. These included workshops in **midwifery**, where students explored the vital role of a midwife and even practiced some of the techniques used during childbirth. The **oncology** session provided an eye-opening introduction to cancer care and treatment, helping students appreciate the emotional and scientific challenges involved in supporting patients and their families. The **social services** workshop gave students a clearer understanding of the responsibilities and real-life impact of social workers, especially when supporting vulnerable children and adults. Meanwhile, in the **adult and child nursing** workshops, students had the chance to try out nursing skills and gain a better perspective on the different approaches required for caring across age groups.

The day was not only packed with valuable learning, but also a lot of fun. Students enjoyed getting a taste of university life, asking questions, and working together in a new environment. The experience brought their classroom learning to life and has inspired many to think more deeply about their future careers in health and social care. Year 12 Sport Scientists Take on VO₂ Max, Strength, and Nutrition at University of South Wales!

Our Year 12 Sport Science students had an exciting and inspiring day out at the University of South Wales, where they took part in a series of specialist workshops designed to deepen their understanding of the world of **sport and exercise science**. One of the highlights of the trip was the chance to experience a **VO₂ Max test** - a cutting-edge assessment used to measure an athlete's maximum oxygen uptake during intense exercise. This test gives valuable insights into cardiovascular fitness and endurance levels, and is commonly used with elite athletes to track their performance and training needs. Watching the test in action gave students a real-world example of how science is applied in professional sport settings.

Students also got hands-on in a **Strength and Conditioning** workshop and took part in an insightful session on **Sports Nutrition and Therapy**. The visit was not only educational, but also a lot of fun. It offered a brilliant chance for students to explore university-level learning, speak to industry experts, and experience the professional world of sport science first-hand.

A big thank you to the University of South Wales for hosting such an engaging and informative day. It was a fantastic opportunity that has left many students feeling inspired about their future in sport science.








Vote for us in the Tesco In-Store Votel






Under 18 Football


