Teaching and Learning Focus: Peer Teaching

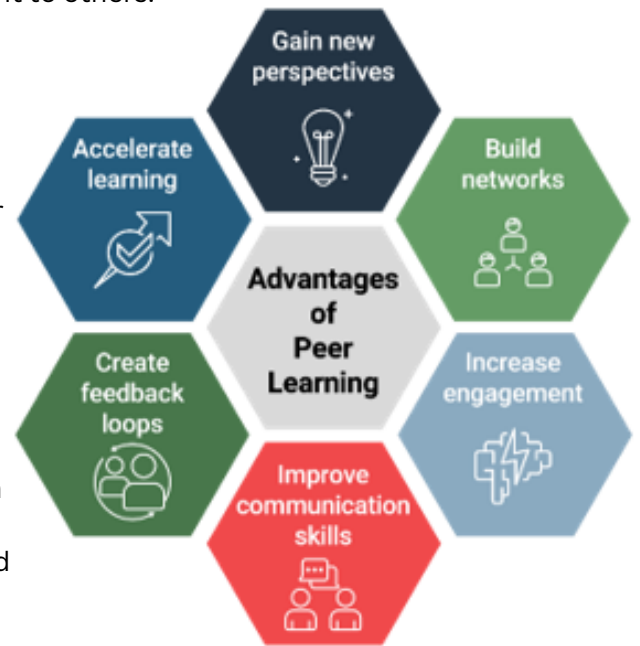
Peer teaching is where students explain concepts or skills to each other under the guidance of their teacher. This might involve:

- One student talking a partner through a problem or process.
- Small group discussions where students take turns explaining ideas.
- Structured activities like think-pair-share or jigsaw tasks, where students are responsible for learning a piece of content and then teaching it to others.

It's not about letting students replace the teacher – it's about reinforcing learning through communication and collaboration.

Peer teaching is supported by strong educational research. It is effective in deepening learning because when students teach others, they are forced to clarify their thinking, spot gaps in their understanding and process information at a deeper level. It helps to build confidence too and allows students to learn to express ideas effectively. It can also have benefits for the student 'learner', who not only learns through listening, but who might feel more comfortable to ask questions from their peer 'teacher'.

To support this at home, you could ask your child to talk through what they learnt today at school. You don't have to know anything about the topic – just getting them to explain it out loud will help them to deepen their understanding and remember it.



Welcome to Class Charts!

Just a reminder that **we have now moved our school information system from Edulink over to Class Charts**. Class Charts will provide you with up-to-date information about your child's attendance and absence reporting, their timetable, reward and sanction points, and other essential school-related information. From September, this will also replace Satchel One, meaning you only need one app to cover all the information you need about your child's progress.

Personalised access codes have been sent to all parents/carers, which will allow you to link your account to your child's information. Thank you to everyone who has already downloaded the app and logged in.

To support you with this transition, please find a **Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)** page, which includes step-by-step instructions on setting up and using Class Charts. Please note, not all modules described in this FAQ are available right now; we will be releasing more modules over time as we embed Class Charts into our in-school processes. 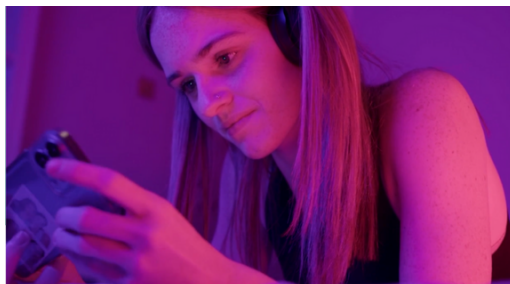

We have been fortunate to continue our excellent links with Howard Tenens again this year with our A-Level Business class.

We were visited on Monday by Peter Evans (Operations Manager), Elliot Ashton (former student and now Senior Development Manager) and Ollie Norris, who left our 6th Form last summer and is now their Commercial Apprentice!

We're delighted that Howard Tenens has a steady history employing students from Rednock and has recruited two more to start this year.

Students had a taste of the world of logistics and participated in a planning activity. Prizes won, but more importantly, links made for students to undertake work experience in a range of fields. We thank Peter, Elliot and Ollie for their time and always enjoy their visits.

Riverfly Monitoring Initiative

On May 23rd our 6th form Biology students spent the day learning about the Riverfly Monitoring Initiative. This is a citizen science project set up by the **Riverfly Partnership** (<https://www.riverflies.org/>) that seeks to monitor and detect the quality of rivers across the UK.

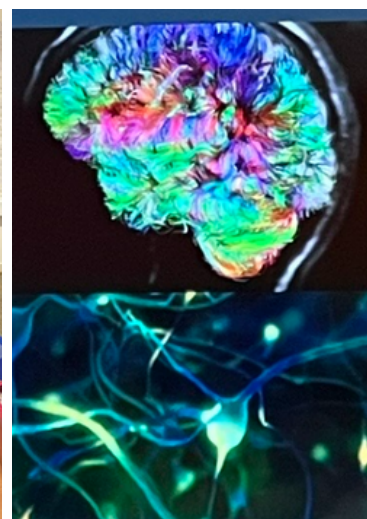
Volunteers from the organisation taught the students how to kick sample to collect invertebrates. They identified the invertebrates and used specific indicator species to determine the overall quality of the river.

We hope to continue to monitor the river species regularly and contribute our data to this important initiative. The students were absolutely brilliant and hopefully gained an appreciation of why monitoring and conservation in our local environment is so important.



Year 12 Psychology

This term, Year 12 Psychology students explored Biological Psychology by investigating how the nervous system controls movement. In a captivating experiment, they used a human-to-human interface to send small electrical signals between each other, stimulating and controlling one another's muscles. This created the sensation of losing voluntary control - mimicking how brain signals can be hijacked. The activity vividly demonstrated the roles of neurons, synapses, and motor pathways, and sparked lively debate about free will versus biological determinism. A truly hands-on (and arm-moving!) way to engage with the science of behaviour and the brain.

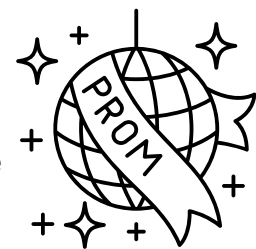

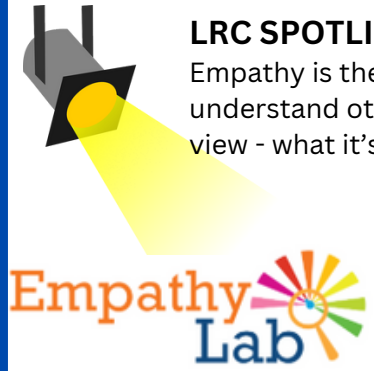

Keeping Safe Online - What you need to know about... Generative AI

The National College 'WakeUpWednesday' guides offer useful advice around online safety. There has been lots in the news recently around the use of AI in schools. Whilst these tools can boost learning and creativity, there are also serious concerns. This guide explores some of the key risks and how to support safe use.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about GENERATIVE AI SAFETY

Generative AI tools – such as ChatGPT – are now commonly used by children. In fact, 3 in 4 pupils in the 2024 Annual Literacy Survey reported using generative AI, up from just 2 in 5 the previous year. While these tools can boost learning and creativity, they also raise concerns around misinformation, privacy and overuse. This guide explores the key risks and how to support safe use.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

- MISINFORMATION AND ACCURACY**
Generative AI can sometimes produce false or misleading content. Children – and even adults – may assume the information is accurate and trustworthy. This can affect learning and understanding of important topics. It's vital to teach children to critically assess all information, even when it comes from AI.
✓ Real

- REDUCED CRITICAL THINKING**
Relying too heavily on AI-generated responses may reduce children's willingness to think independently. If they consistently use AI to solve problems or complete tasks, it could impact their ability to reason, analyse and form their own ideas. Encouraging thoughtful reflection is key.
- EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT**
Because generative AI is trained on vast datasets from across the internet, there is a chance it may occasionally generate harmful or inappropriate content. Without supervision, children could encounter disturbing or unsuitable material. Active monitoring and clear usage boundaries can help reduce this risk.
CENSORED
- DIGITAL DEPENDENCY**
Regular use of generative AI can contribute to increased screen time and less real-world interaction. If left unmanaged, it may affect physical activity levels, sleep, and social development. Striking a healthy balance between online and offline activities is important for wellbeing.
- PRIVACY AND DATA SECURITY**
Some AI tools ask for personal details or store users' interactions. If privacy settings are not correctly configured, children's personal data could be exposed or misused. Teaching good digital hygiene and setting strong privacy controls is essential for protecting children online.
- UNCLEAR ETHICAL BOUNDARIES**
Children may not fully understand the ethical implications of using AI to complete homework or creative tasks. This can lead to unintentional plagiarism or dishonest academic practices. Conversations around responsible use and academic honesty are crucial.

Advice for Parents & Educators

- ESTABLISH CLEAR GUIDELINES**
Set clear, age-appropriate rules for when and how generative AI can be used. Reinforce these regularly to help children develop a healthy, respectful and informed relationship with the technology.
- ENCOURAGE CRITICAL EVALUATION**
Help children to question the accuracy of AI-generated information and seek out additional trusted sources. This builds essential digital literacy skills and supports better decision-making.
- PROMOTE ACTIVE SUPERVISION**
Keep an eye on how the children in your care use AI tools. Check in regularly to ensure they're using them appropriately and be ready to step in if something doesn't feel right.
- ENHANCE PRIVACY AWARENESS**
Talk to children about the importance of keeping personal information private. Make sure privacy settings are in place and explain how data shared with AI tools could be used.
