Teaching and Learning Focus: Flipped Learning

An innovative approach that is sometimes used to vary content delivery and engage students in a different way is flipped learning.

Flipped learning turns the traditional classroom model on its head. Instead of learning new content in class and doing homework after, students first explore new material at home, for example through videos, podcasts or reading assignments. Then, when they come to school, they use class time to dive deeper - working on problems, discussing ideas and applying what they've learned with the support of their teacher and other students.

Flipped learning has several benefits:

- **More active learning**. Class time becomes more interactive and focused on problem-solving, collaboration and discussion.
- Pace that fits the student. Students can pause, rewind, and review learning materials at home, helping them learn at their own speed.
- **Better use of class time.** Teachers can spend more time helping students individually or in small groups, rather than delivering content.
- Encourages responsibility. Students take more ownership of their learning.



As the holidays start, it is never too early to think about the good habits we want to instill in the new academic year. Students who attend school 95%+ of the time are 2 times more likely to achieve grades 5+ in Maths and English, than those who attend for 90% of the time and who miss 4 weeks in the school year.



Equally, students who miss days in the first couple of weeks of Term 1 are more likely to end up missing long periods of time, and end up with attendance of less than 90%. As already seen, this absence can go on to impact their progress and success, not to mention the all important social experiences of a new school year.





Exploring Careers in Science!

Students in Year 9 science lessons have been at it again. Continuing their work on the careers of technicians, we have been exploring how lighting technicians design sets for film, TV and in the theatre. Students experimented with blending colours and used their understanding of this to light a scene for a space themed film.

Across the topic students have looked at the work of technicians in the construction, medical, entertainment, water supply and video game industries to name a few. These have been fantastic and engaging hands-on practical lessons and we have really enjoyed this as a department. It has been a great way to close the year.

National Scientific Thinking Challenge

In May, our Year 10 triple science students took part in the **National Scientific Thinking Challenge**. This challenge encouraged students to apply critical thinking, creativity, and scientific curiosity to solve real-world problems. Each student who completed the challenge demonstrated impressive dedication and a genuine enthusiasm for science. Their hard work has been recognised with a certificate, awarded in a special presentation held earlier this week.



They competed against over 16,000 other students from a range of schools across the country (state, grammar and private). We were ecstatic to get the results the other week to find that a third of our students had scored in the top 40% of the country and have been awarded a bronze, silver or gold award! Congratulations to all involved – we are incredibly proud of your achievements!

Bronze awards, students scored in the top 40% of entrants and had to get 67% or more: Macey, Juliette, Amber S-C, Harry S, Poppy C, Dominic, Freddie P, Austin W.

Silver awards, top 25% with a score of 74% or higher: Verity, Willow, Oliver M, Georgina, Ethan P, Ezrie, Reuben A, Victoria.

Graduating from The Scholar's Programme

We are delighted to report that a group of our Year 10 students have successfully graduated from 'The Scholars Programme', run by education charity The Brilliant Club. The hard-working students produced challenging university-style essays exploring the question, "How to Feed the World?"



Students were encouraged to think and work independently across seven tutorials with a subject expert PhD researcher. During the programme, they learnt about how food production has changed over time, genetic modification and a range of sustainable modern farming methods and then completed a challenging final essay which was given a university-level grade.

The Scholars Programme supports students aged 8-18 years to develop the knowledge, skills and confidence needed to progress to the country's most competitive universities and succeed when they get there. On the 1st July, the students attended Bristol University for their graduation event. This included a tour of the site, and time to reflect, present and meet with other students who had also completed the course. A great day was had by all and our students were a credit to Rednock!



As we start the summer holidays, it is always good to have a reminder about Water Safety, to help ensure children can enjoy swimming and other water based activities safely and responsibly...

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators ING SAFE AROUND WATER

LIFEGUARD

Enjoying time in, on, and around water plays a vital role in a young person's overall development, offering a healthy and exhilarating way to have fun. This guide outlines essential safety advice, based on the Royal Life Saving Society UK's Water Safety Code, to help ensure children can enjoy swimming and similar activities safely and responsibly.

STICK TO LIFEGUARDED AREAS

It's never advisable to enter unsupervised bodies of water, especially alone. Instead, it's considered best practice to accompany children to places with lifeguards, as they will be trained to respond swiftly in emergencies and provide first aid when needed.

LEARN SIGNS AND FLAGS

When going to a new environment, it's important to research the local area and make children aware of safety signage before entering the water. If visiting the seaside, make sure children are always supervised by an adult and that they know what different beach flags mean, so they're knowledgeable of where and when they can enter the sea when they can enter the sea.

STOP AND THINK

ıng people should be cautious before Young people should be cautious before entering water, as it's difficult to know what hazards could be underneath. Use the Water Safety Code and encourage children to ask themselves questions such as, "is the water too deep or too shallow? Are there currents, tides, or underwater objects?" Make sure children know never to enter water from a height, as what lurks below could cause serious injuries. elow could cause serious injuries.

CONSIDER WATER TEMPERATURE

Tragedies strike when young people experience cold water shock. Never let children enter water quickly; instead, ensure that they enter slowly and carefully to allow their bodies to adjust to the temperature or exit easily if needed.

INFLATABLE SAFETY

Although inflatables may seem like a fun idea when visiting locations like the beach, they can float further out from shore and into more dangerous water. It's advisable only to use inflatables in spaces like appropriately managed swimming pools, where they're used in more controlled and supervised environments.

SUPERVISION

For young children, and particularly those under the age of five, it's important for them to be supervised at home, outside and at the pool at all times. It's essential for parents and educators to understand that young children can drown quickly and silently; therefore, anyone supervising them must maintain constant watch in case they get into difficulty.

DON'T GO **TOO FAR**

When swimming, especially in open water, it's best to teach children to stay within a safe depth. Share advice with them such as only entering water up to a standing depth, and in the case of visiting the beach, swim parallel to shorelines. This will allow a child to stay in control and get out of the water easily

KEEP POOLS AND TUBS DRAINED

For parents of young children, a simple way to protect them at home is to keep outdoor spaces and bathrooms tidy after playtime. This includes removing water from paddling pools after use and turning them over, returning lids to hot tubs and taking toys out of baths, so all water can be fully drained from the tub.

FLOAT AND CALL 999

If a child gets into difficulty in the water, they should try to float on their back, stay calm, and call for help. If a young person sees someone else in trouble, they should dial 999 or 112 immediately, then shout to reassure their friend, encouraging them to float on their back, and letting them know that help is on the way. Children should never enter the water to attempt a rescue or retrieve belongings.

TEACH WATER

Beyond swimming lessons, children should be educated in school on water safety. Use RLSS UK's accredited programme, 'Water Smart Schools', which offers free lesson plans and resources on how to be safe on, near and around water by following the Water Safety Code

The Royal Life Saving Society UK (RLSS UK) is a national water safety charity that gives children the chance to enjoy a lifetime of fun in the water, safely. Water safety education provided in schools is vital and, in some instances, could be a child's only opportunity to learn about the




