Teaching and Learning Focus

Our Design & Technology after-school club runs on Wednesday and Thursday evenings, giving students the opportunity to spend additional time in the workshop and develop their practical skills in a relaxed and supportive environment.

The club is open to students who are keen to explore the subject further, whether they are currently studying Design & Technology or simply have an interest in making and designing. It provides a valuable chance for students to try out new experiences within the subject, experiment with tools and materials, and develop confidence in their practical abilities.

A key benefit of the club is the opportunity for students to practise and refine their skills outside of normal lesson time. Students can take the time to improve techniques, work more carefully on their projects, and develop a deeper understanding of how products are designed and manufactured. The sessions are also particularly useful for students who may want to remake or improve elements of a project that did not go to plan during lessons. Having extra time allows them to learn from mistakes, solve problems, and achieve a higher standard in their work.

Overall, the D&T club is a great way for students to develop creativity, resilience and practical skills, while enjoying the process of designing and making alongside their peers.





St Ives Art Trip

We took the GCSE and A-level art and photography students on a residential trip to St Ives. During the trip students enjoyed guided tours of the Tate Gallery and The Barbara Hepworth Museum. On the second day the weather was very kind to us and so we were able to go ahead with all our planned outdoor activities. Students enjoyed workshops with local artist Greg Humphries and photographer Chris Webber, and also participated in beach sculpting, drawing on the beach, camera skills and photographing the local area.

I thought the St Ives trip was a really good trip! We got to try out different methods of using charcoal with the different elements around us like the rain and how it impacted charcoal's properties. The weather was very on and off the time we were there, but overall it was such an enjoyable trip and would highly recommend it to people who took art/photography.

Exploring Anatomy: Year 7 Students Dissect Chicken Legs

In a recent hands-on science lesson, Year 7 students took part in an engaging and educational dissection of chicken legs to better understand how muscles, tendons and bones work together to enable movement. While the idea of dissection can initially make some students nervous, the activity quickly became a fascinating exploration of real-life anatomy in action.

For some students, this was their first experience with dissection. Initial hesitation quickly turned into curiosity as they began to identify different tissues and understand their functions. Hands-on learning like this helps make abstract biological concepts tangible and memorable.

By the end of the lesson, students had gained a deeper appreciation for how complex and well-designed the musculoskeletal system is. Activities like these not only strengthen understanding of biology but also inspire curiosity about how our own bodies work.

Robotics, Resilience and a Roaring Dinosaur Dance-Off!

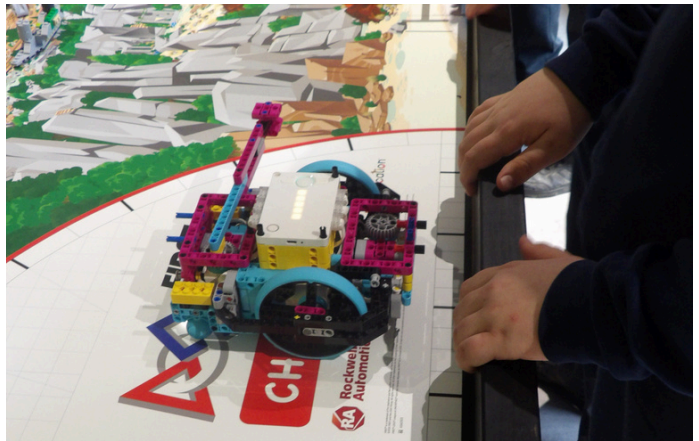
Last Friday, ten of our students travelled to Bristol to take part in the FIRST LEGO League robotics competition hosted at GKN. After weeks of designing, building and coding their robot, the team were excited to finally put their hard work to the test against other schools.

The challenge required students to program their robot to complete a series of missions on a themed competition table. It sounds simple, but behind every successful run is a huge amount of teamwork, problem-solving and perseverance. Along the way our students encountered plenty of hurdles, which led to them redesigning parts of their robot, refining their code and learning how to make improvements under pressure. Their determination paid off, and they put on a great performance on the day.

Although we ran out of time to complete every mission we had planned, the experience was a fantastic one. The students showed brilliant collaboration, creativity and resilience throughout the competition. Just as importantly, they supported each other and represented the school wonderfully.

The event wasn't all serious robotics either! In between matches the team helped kickstart an impromptu dinosaur themed dance-off and even led a conga line around the GKN venue, bringing plenty of energy and laughter to the day.

It was a fantastic experience for everyone involved. The students learned a huge amount about engineering, coding and teamwork, and they've already come away with lots of ideas for how to improve their robot next time. A brilliant day all round and well done to the whole team!





The Human Arm in Action

In Biology, students learn how the human arm moves using models made from lollipop sticks and elastic bands to represent bones and antagonistic muscle pairs. While useful, these models were fragile and limited in demonstrating the mechanics of movement.

Recognising the need for something more effective, the Science department approached DT with a challenge. Mr Moir immediately took it on, producing a prototype within 24 hours. After classroom testing and refinements, the final design exceeded expectations: a durable, high-quality model that clearly demonstrates how muscles work together to move the elbow joint.

This project is a powerful example of STEM in action. Scientific understanding identified the need; design and engineering expertise provided the solution. By combining subject knowledge and practical skill, both departments created a resource that significantly enhances learning.

Most importantly, students benefit – not only from improved equipment, but from seeing first-hand how collaboration and innovation solve real-world problems.

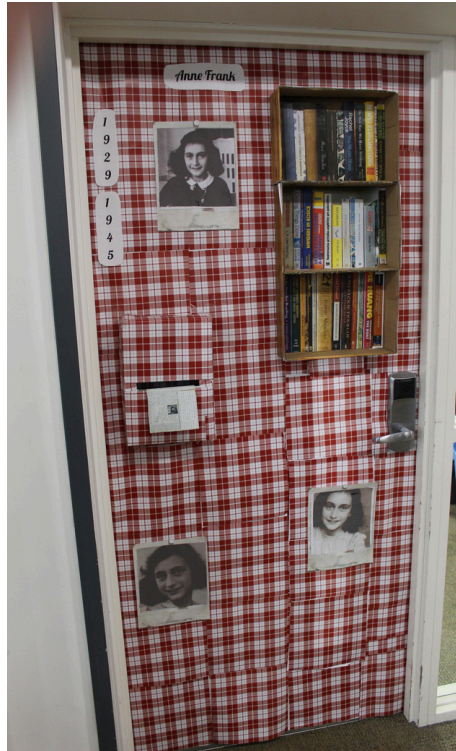
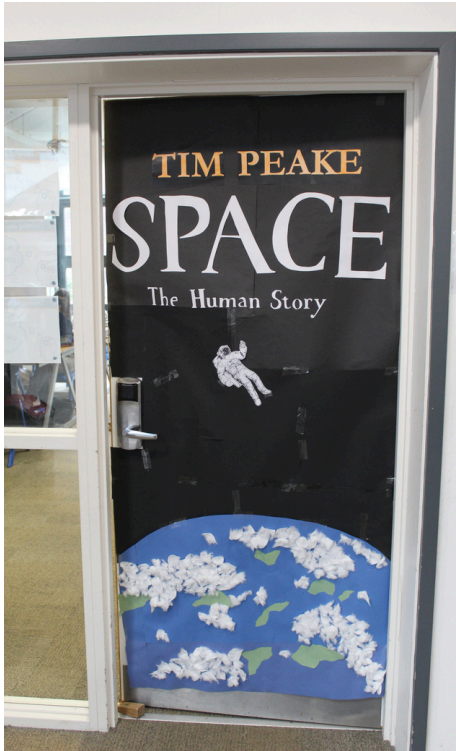




World Book Day Tutor Door Competition

Ernest Cook Trust

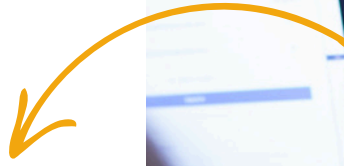

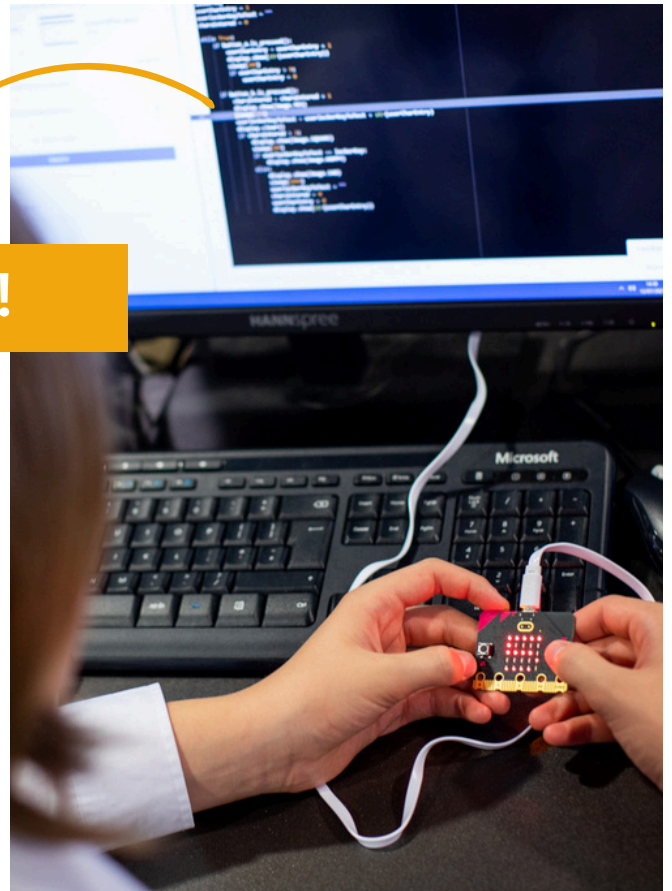

Department for Science, Innovation & Technology

Supporting Children to Stay Safe Online

The Department for Science, Innovation and Technology (DSIT) has launched a new media literacy campaign to help families build confidence in navigating the online world. The campaign aims to support parents and carers in helping children develop critical thinking skills so they can recognise misleading content and challenge harmful attitudes online.

Research shows that only four in ten parents say their child has spoken to them about concerning experiences online, and fewer than a quarter feel very confident about knowing what their children see online. The campaign encourages regular conversations at home, asking simple questions such as “Who shared this, and why?” to help children think more critically about what they see online. A new [Kids Online Safety Hub](#), created with the Department for Education, provides guidance and resources for parents to support these discussions and better understand the digital spaces their children use.

Parents are encouraged to talk regularly with their children about their online experiences – both positive and negative – to help them stay safe and informed online.

Phone Free from September 2026 – Phone Pouch Project

As part of our ongoing commitment to making Rednock the safest, most supportive, inclusive and ambitious school it can be, we are always reflecting on how we can further improve students' experience. One issue constantly challenges schools locally and nationally. It impacts safeguarding, behaviour, wellbeing and learning. This issue is mobile phones in schools.

[The Department for Education](#) has been clear that mobile phones are one of the biggest distractions in classrooms, affecting student focus, behaviour and attainment. Despite “phones off and out of sight” policies, the reality in schools across the country is that phones are still accessed during the day, particularly in less supervised spaces such as corridors, toilets and social times.

This is not about blaming our youngsters - quite the opposite actually! Mobile phone use is a societal norm and pressure that today's children are growing up with. However, as educators and adults, we have a responsibility to respond to the growing body of research highlighting the impact of constant phone access on concentration, wellbeing and mental health. Everyday, my staff support students in navigating friendship issues, social media fallouts and anxieties that stem from phone use. We believe school should be a space where students can focus, build positive relationships and feel free from these distractions.

From September 2026, Rednock will take a proactive step to strengthen this approach. Our aim is simple: to help students be happier, more focused and fully present during the school day.

In summary, from September 2026, all students in Years 7–11 who bring a mobile phone to school will be required to secure it in a safety pouch at the start of the day. The pouch will remain in their bag and locked for the duration of the school day. Mobile phones will not be used anywhere on school premises. We believe this change will have a significant positive impact on learning, behaviour, safeguarding and,

importantly, wellbeing of our students. Many schools that have introduced similar systems report improved focus in lessons, fewer behaviour incidents and stronger peer relationships. However, we would be a leading school in the district taking this step.
