As points build within each category, students unlock virtual badges that recognise their achievements.

Achieving the Rednock Passport is a significant accomplishment, awarded only once a student has earned every available badge. To mark this exceptional achievement, Bella has been presented with a special Rednock pin to wear with pride.



This milestone reflects not only academic dedication, but also the character, determination and positive attitude we encourage in all members of our school community. 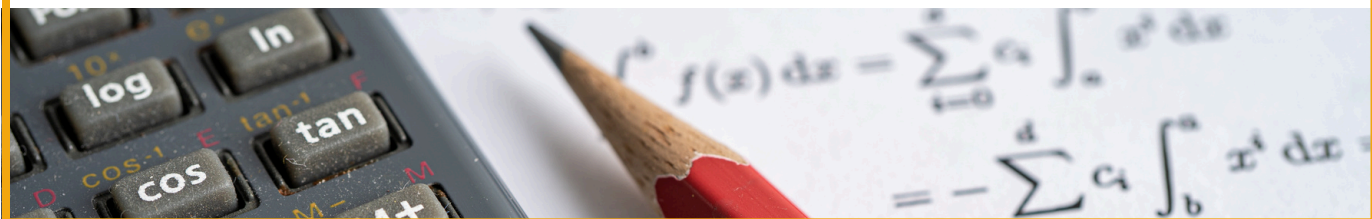
## Year 11 Arrangements for Term 6 and Super Study Sessions

As we approach the end of Term 5, we would like to remind Year 11 students and parents/carers about the arrangements in place for the examination period during Term 6.

### Basic Guidelines for Year 11's in Term 6

- Any student arriving after 9.00am must enter the school via Main Reception and sign in using the sheets provided.
- Students attending the 8.45am revision sessions should sign in with the member of staff leading the session.
- Students leaving the school site before the end of the school day at 3.10pm must sign out at Main Reception.
- Where a Super Study session clashes with an examination, students may join the session once their exam has finished.
- Any revision materials shared during Super Study sessions will also be made available afterwards.
- Students must wear full school uniform when attending school for examinations or revision sessions.





## Teaching and Learning Focus – Taking the learning outside in Geography

Year 7 Geography students ventured outside for their learning over the last fortnight. They were working on a project investigating infiltration rates on different surfaces in order to work out which areas of the Rednock site are the most susceptible to flooding. The photos show the students in action at various locations, for example in grassy areas or in areas with trees.

Once they came back into the classroom, students used the data they collected to produce their written project, which was structured in the same way as a GCSE or A Level NEA. They had to complete sections for data presentation, data analysis, conclusions and an evaluation of their fieldwork. This is designed to give the students a taste of their progression through the subject and to help them to begin to develop the skills they will need as they move through the school.

In addition to being a valuable learning opportunity, the students enjoyed being outside and having a go at some real world geography.





## Junior Mathematical Challenge

Rednock School is incredibly proud of the 110 students, in Year 7 and Year 8, who were selected to represent the school in the prestigious UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Junior Mathematical Challenge. The UKMT is a charitable organisation dedicated to advancing the education of young mathematicians.

We are delighted to celebrate the outstanding achievements of our students, with 51 participants earning bronze, silver or gold certificates. Of these, 38 students achieved a bronze certificate, 9 achieved a silver certificate and 4 students succeeded in achieving a gold certificate. Most of the certificate recipients are pictured. These are truly impressive results from our talented Year 7 and Year 8 mathematicians.

Huge congratulations to Henry in Year 8, who not only achieved a gold certificate but also attained the highest score in the school. Additionally, congratulations to other three gold certificate recipients: Riley in Year 8; Edward and Myiah who are joint highest in Year 7.

Best of luck to Henry, Edward and Myiah, who have qualified for the next round of the competition: the Junior Kangaroo.





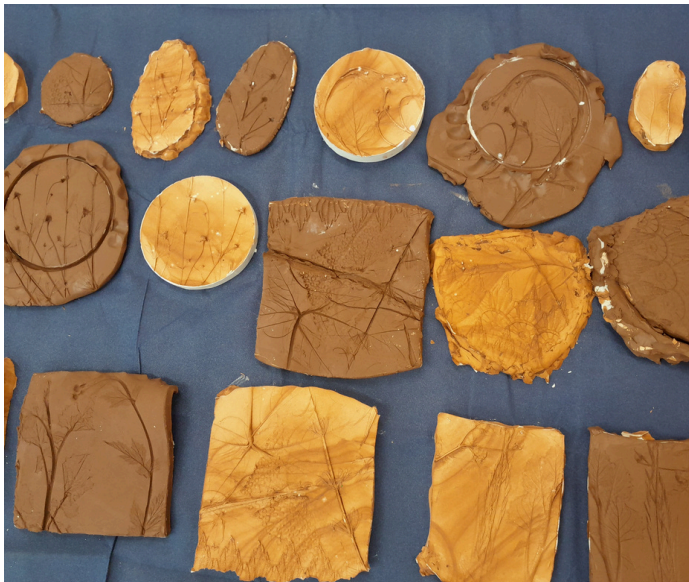
## Ceramics Wellbeing Workshop

On Monday 11th May, we were joined by ceramicists Claire, Shirley and Julie, who led a wonderful botanical casting workshop, inspired by Claire's professional work.

The group began by exploring the school grounds to forage for plants and leaves to use in their work. Students then worked alongside the artists to learn how to make impressions in clay and cast their own small, ceramic pieces to take home.

The students thoroughly enjoyed spending time with the supportive artists and particularly loved rolling foliage into the clay before carefully removing it to reveal the beautiful imprints left behind.

As well as creating individual pieces, the students also collaborated on a large artwork that will remain in school. More will be revealed about this beautiful piece in the next edition of the Rednock Review.

## Year 9 Students Reach RIAT Finals in STEM Challenge

A group of Year 9 students recently took part in an exciting STEM Challenge, putting their creativity, teamwork and problem-solving skills to the test through a series of fun, hands-on LEGO® robotics activities.

The challenge was based around the theme of living sustainably on Mars, encouraging students to think like future engineers and scientists as they explored how humans could survive on another planet. Working in teams, students were tasked with designing, building and coding robotic solutions to real-world problems linked to sustainability, transport, energy and survival on Mars.

Throughout the competition, students demonstrated excellent communication, resilience and innovation as they programmed their LEGO® robots to complete a range of complex missions. The event gave students the opportunity to develop valuable STEM skills while also experiencing the excitement of engineering and robotics in a competitive environment.

The standard was high and huge congratulations go to everyone who took part.

## Redwood

Our visits to Redwood, The Ernest Cook Trust's woodland site on the Slimbridge Estate, have continued to be a real highlight for our year 7 students.

Of course, one of the biggest highlights of the afternoon was making s'mores around the fire. The students thoroughly enjoyed toasting marshmallows and spending time together outdoors. 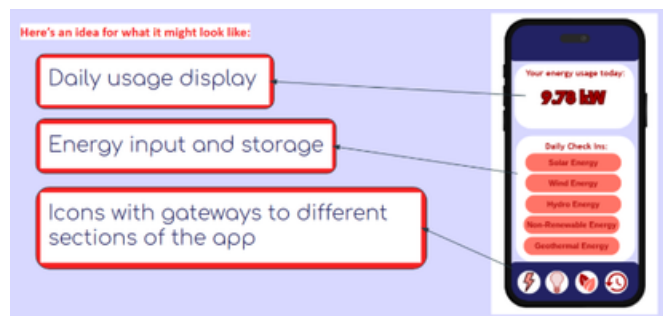
## Raspberry Pi Competition

## Hundred Heroines Photography Club

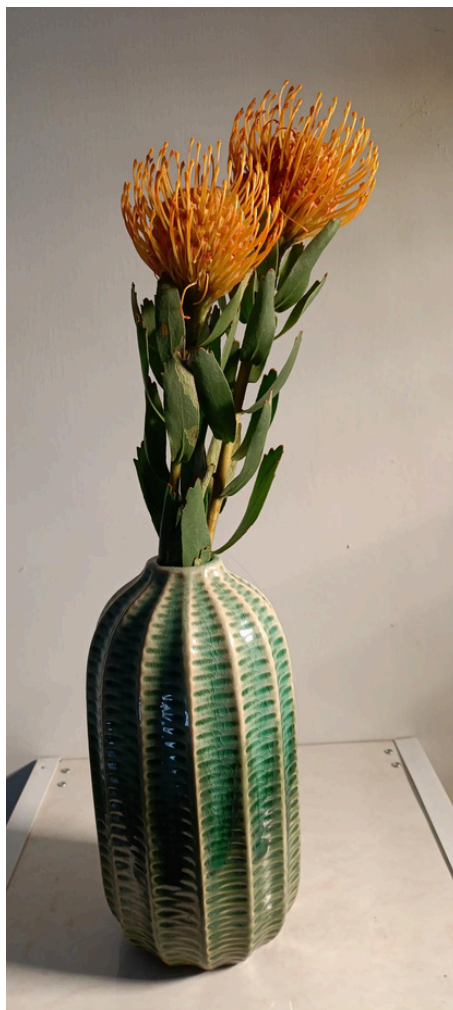
We would like to thank Hundred Heroines for running a fantastic after-school photography club for some of our Year 10 photography students.

Over the course of the programme, students explored a range of photographic techniques and developed their confidence behind the camera in a supportive and creative environment. The sessions gave students the opportunity to experiment, share ideas and learn from experienced photographers while developing their own artistic style.

In the final workshop, Rita led an engaging session focused on lighting techniques and composition. Using a variety of objects she had kindly brought in, students experimented with different light sources, angles and arrangements to see how lighting can dramatically change the mood, texture and impact of a photograph.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the hands-on nature of the session and showed great creativity while exploring different compositions and effects. It was wonderful to see them growing in confidence as they worked collaboratively, discussed their ideas and refined their images.

We are incredibly grateful to the team at Hundred Heroines for providing such an inspiring opportunity for our students and for encouraging their creativity and enthusiasm for photography.





## Supporting Confidence in the Classroom

Ella, Year 11, has been making a positive difference by supporting three students in Years 7 and 9 who were initially struggling with anxiety about school. Through regular one-on-one conversations and by sharing her own experiences, she helped the students feel more confident, calm, and focused in their lessons.

By building trust and offering encouragement, Ella, right, created a supportive environment where the students could grow in confidence and feel more comfortable in the classroom. Her support has helped them develop strategies to manage their worries and thrive at school.

Ella also wants students to know that support is always available. Any student who may be struggling or feeling anxious is encouraged to speak to a member of staff, who will be able to help them access the support they need.

Reflecting on the experience, Ella said she found the role incredibly rewarding and was grateful for the opportunity to support her peers and make a meaningful impact on their school experience.



## Gloucester Rugby Power Project

## Child's Farm

Earlier this week Sixth Form students had the great opportunity to hear from the founder of Child's Farm, Joanna Jensen, whose inspiring talk explored entrepreneurship, resilience, and the realities of building a successful business. Having also presented a TED talk just last month on her journey and experiences in business. Throughout the session, she spoke honestly about the challenges involved in creating a company from the ground up, reinforcing the idea that success is rarely immediate or straightforward. Rather than dodging the discussion of failure, she encouraged it, highlighting the importance of her mistakes as it gave her opportunities to learn and improve. Her overall message emphasises the value of perseverance and not giving up when things get hard, particularly resonating with Sixth Form students preparing for their lives beyond school, as she shed light on the necessity of staying motivated, being adaptable as well as taking opportunities even when the outcome seems uncertain.

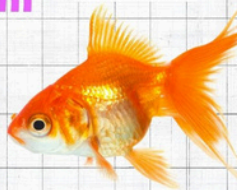
