In football parlance, this is a 'top four' European place for our school in a league of 500 schools. This is a remarkable achievement and reflects the immense amount of hard work of our staff and students over the last twelve months.

We were delighted to celebrate those achievements with the Class of 2013 at the recent Presentation Evening. Professor Tony McFadyen from the University of Reading, our guest of honour, was present to present GCSE awards to a wonderful group of students who achieved some of the best results the school has ever had. It was a huge pleasure to see the students again and we all hope that they stay in touch





in the future.

And what a term it has been. Our students have enjoyed a wide range of opportunities, activities and challenges, many of which are reported in this newsletter. And, at the time of writing, a group of Y9 and Y10 students are currently experiencing a memorable trip to Poland with the Humanities team.

Year 7's build Oilrigs



4 people from BP visited some of the year 7 students in the Design Technology room in November. They came to give us a presentation of how oil is extracted from the North Sea, for use in all of our daily lives. They gave us a challenge to create an oilrig out of marshmallows and straws.

They split us into about 8 groups of around 7 students; our challenge was to create a sturdy oilrig from marshmallows and straws. Every marshmallow and every straw cost \$1,000,000 each, since generally an oilrig costs up to \$2,000,000,000. The oilrig had to hold 200g and had to be around 20cm tall. In addition it had to be made as deeply as possible!

There were 2 teams who won, both models were 19cm tall, cost \$24,000,000 and both held 200g. Both groups collected 3 BP branded prizes each.

Climate Change Conference

The main aim of the Conference was to educate everyone on how important the environment is and how climate change affects the environment. We also wanted to show everyone how easy it can be to make a sustainable world by using renewable sources of energy such as wind power, and simple things such as turning off lights when they are not needed to be on or to close doors to keep the warmth in.

Each school had a team of students who represented a country. Each country had to come up with arguments against the other countries and ones to defend themselves against the other country's questions and arguments. Each school had two countries except Whitchurch who just had one. Langtree had the USA and India, Henley College had Canada and Brazil, Theale Green had Australia and South Africa, Icknield had the UK and Bangladesh, Bradfield had Russia and China and Whitchurch had the Maldives.

First we started with Mr Peter McManners, an environmentalist and author, who welcomed every school and gave us an explanation of how the conference was set out. This was followed by Professor Nigel Arnell from the University of Reading who gave us a talk on local impacts on climate change, how climate change happens and its effects on the planet. Then every school group gave a speech on their country explaining what they had done to minimise climate change, what are they doing at the moment and what they were planning to do. After that we listened to a talk by Professor Brian Hoskins from London's Imperial College and the University of Reading. He gave us a talk on both the national and international climate change po-

litical scene at the moment.

Emil and the Detectives: National Theatre Visit

On 2nd December a group of Year 10 students went to the National Theatre, Southbank, London to see the above production. Below are some of the reviews written by our Year 10 students.

Phoebe Bennett: 'the pantomime elements brought a comedy element to the show'

Harper Ford: 'really effective use of semiotics of colour in the production. For example the contrast between the black sinister suits of the adults in the city and the warmer/paler costumes of the the child detectives which symbolised their purity'.

Thalia Swann: 'In the dream sequence the words flashing up behind Emil expressed his emotions, which effectively reinforced the character's feelings'

Greg Chandler: 'very effective use of semiotics of colour for example the dark red of the sinister character's hotel room symbolised the danger and intensity of the moment'

Megan Gainsford: 'the audience participation when we had to stand up and join in helped us to empathise with the feelings of the characters and made us feel like we were part of their secret group. This made me feel like I was being personally involved.'

Conrad Heath: 'the use of lighting with many torches in the sewer scene created tension, because it gave us a perspective of the narrow sewer tunnels and the journey of the characters through them.'

Liam Rowntree: 'the way the lights flickered repeatedly in the train scene was effective because it conveyed Emil's semi-consciousness'.

Gill Pimm, Head of Drama: 'when the money fluttered onto the audience from the sky at the resolution of the plot it was truly magical!'
