


# February 2020 Newsletter

As I write this first newsletter of the new decade I can hear our year 11 students excitedly waiting for their mock interviews. We are extremely grateful to the governors, parents and friends of the school who have given up their time to help our students practise this valuable skill. This comes at the end of a busy term for this cohort which started with their mock exams and they are now busy working on the improvements necessary to ensure they are successful in the actual exams.

Langtree's run of incredible success in sport continues. Last night the netball team came second in the district tournament and earlier this term the year 7 5-a-side football team won the district tournament which meant they qualified for the South of England competition. Up against the best teams from across the whole of the South of England - including ones that had flown in from the Channel Islands, the girls won their group, were victorious in the semi-final only to be beaten in the final. But for "Little Old Langtree" to be officially the second best team in this part of the country is an absolutely outstanding achievement.



It is not just in sport that we achieve success. Last night's talent show demonstrated the breadth and depth of our students skills. Where else can you see pogo sticking, trombone solos, an Ozzy Osborne song and the victorious year 10 boys dance routine on one bill?

Today we witnessed a performance by the Langtree entry into the Rotary public speaking competition, "Youth Speaks", Ramiya, Elanor and Rob presented a well-researched, beautifully balanced and confidently delivered argument about the pros and cons of stem cell research. Unfortunately they were not able to deliver this publicly as their heat was cancelled due to the other schools withdrawing but I want to find an opportunity for them to showcase their amazing work to an audience.

This term we have also won a cyber security competition, had three teams qualify for the Student Investor Challenge semi finals (out of the 9 215 teams that entered) and came second in the Geographical Association Schools Quiz. There are numerous other student achievements celebrated in this newsletter and our weekly bulletin.

We are also extremely proud of the way the students have taken to our various environmental initiatives this term. Following discussions with the school council environment committee we took the decision to dramatically reduce the amount of disposable packaging used in the canteen. Previously many students had their meals served in disposable



amount of disposable packaging used in the canteen. Previously many students had their meals served in disposable (albeit biodegradable) containers. Students now have the option of either bringing in a takeaway container from home or having their meal served on a plate. As well as reducing the amount we send to landfill this move has increased the number of students sitting down 'eating properly' as well as decreasing the amount of litter around the school. In addition our students have recycled over fifty thousand crisp packets. This says a great deal about their commitment to the environment, but perhaps less about the healthiness of their diets!

#### **Geography Association Quiz**

On Wednesday the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January, six students succeeded in showing that Langtree holds high standards when it comes to geographical knowledge at the Geography Association Quiz held at Reading Boys Grammar School. The students representing the school were: Niamh, Ashley, Erin, Jasmine, Alby and Daniel. A grand total of eighteen teams were in attendance, two of which were our very own Langtree Teams 1 and 2. Each team had three members; one from Year 8, one Year 9, and a captain from Year 10. They were up against the very best private and state schools from Berkshire and south Oxfordshire, for example Trinity School who won in 2019 and St Bartholomew's who won in 2018. However, tough competition and the historic Reading Boys school hall did not faze our students!

The quiz kicked off with a complicated first round in which the competitors had to name the country that belonged to flags that were shown on the projector. It sounds simple, but wait until you have a go with the example below! (Without using the internet):

Langtree Team 1 performed extremely well on this round with an impressive 20 out of 20 marks, Team 2 following closely behind with 17. Three more rounds followed - one of which was identifying UK landmarks from a small revealed part of a picture. Solid preparation helped our students in this bumper point round – 5 points per correct landmark identified from one revealed square - and surprisingly when the scores were revealed at the end of round three Langtree Team 1 was first place!

Following were 4 more tough rounds that included country capital anagrams and Geography in the news that had both teams scratching their heads. How well would you have done? Here's a sample question to try (without the internet!) 'The Australian Government dropped lots of what vegetable on areas affected by wildfires to feed kangaroos whose food sources had been destroyed?'

Finally, after seven rounds the scores were revealed. The tension in the hall was palpable as quizmaster Mr Gunson read out first, second and third places. Both our teams were doubtful Langtree would make a podium place after the particularly difficult 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> rounds... But, missing out on 1<sup>st</sup> place by THREE POINTS... Langtree Team 1 came second with 117 points!

#### Absence Requests (other than for medical appointments)

Parents may not authorise absence; only schools can do this. Schools may authorise any absence they deem appropriate; conversely, they can refuse to authorise any absence. Parents do not have an automatic right to withdraw students from school for a holiday, and, in law, have to apply for permission in advance. Retrospective approval may not be given. Holidays taken during term time without approval from the Headteacher will be recorded as unauthorised. Removal of your child for a holiday in term time without permission without authorisation from the Headteacher may lead to issuing of fixed penalty notice or even prosecution under section 444 of the Education Act.

#### What to do:

Requesting absence should be done in writing at least one month prior to the absence. If the child does not return to school after an agreed period, they may be marked as having unauthorised absence.
