It has been a long and busy term since we returned for the start of the academic year. As we enjoyed the last warm days of summer and shared stories of our holidays we celebrated another set of fantastic examination results. Mr Nonweiler and I joke that every school's press release

joke that every school's press release always has "Best Results Ever!". However, this year at Langtree we can justifiably make that claim as the results are certainly the best we have achieved since the new GCSEs were implemented and stand up alongside any in the school's history. Overall, 83% of students achieved the Basics Measure of English and Mathematics at level 4 or above, and 58% did so at level 5 or above. This measure alone exceeds the very best 'basics measure' the school has ever achieved. Our Attainment 8 score, which at 54.6 is well above the previous high levels of 51, and the indicative Progress 8 score of +0.50 is again better than the previous best of +0.33, which indicates that overall, on average students at Langtree half a grade higher than expected in all their GCSE subjects.

At the time of writing we are collecting donations of food and groceries for our harvest festival which is then passed on to the lovely people at the Wallingford Food Bank.

Our sponsored walk took place after the delay of a week due to inclement weather, so far the total of sponsorship money collected stands at £9250.00 this will be used to buy some much needed new computers for the school and provide some funds to the school council so they can deliver on some of the excellent ideas for school improvement they discussed at their recent conference last week. Please collect any remaining sponsor money over half term and send into school during the first week of term 2.

Our new Year 7 cohort have settled in very well and are now fully integrated as part of the Langtree community and are looking forward to the inaugural Primary Teachers Tea. Year 7 will be welcoming some of their Year 6 teachers to Langtree to show off their new school and the work they have done in the first term. Our Year 7 have also continued the recent run of exceptional success in the sporting field winning all their matches in the recent area hockey tournament to become area champions. Well done to all the girls and to their head coach Mrs. Lackey.

Our new members of teaching staff have also settled in extremely well and are already making a fantastic contribution to Langtree life. All our staff continue to amaze me with their energy and dedication. Not only planning and delivering outstanding lessons but also providing a hugely vibrant programme of extra curricular activities, from Latin to salsa, maths problem solving, to visits from authors and other exciting and inspiring speakers. Please keep your eye on the parent calendar and the weekly bulletin so you do not miss more exciting opportunities that our staff have to offer students in the forthcoming months.

In the final week of this term we held wonderful celebration of the Performing Arts at Langtree with a KS 3 Music and Drama Evening. In our small school, it is quite amazing to note that the evening featured performances from our 2 orchestras, 3 choirs and the KS 3 Drama Club whose membership numbers over 50. That represents nearly a third of the school's KS3 school's population in one arts event! Congratulations to all the students involved and Mr Henderson and Mrs Pimm who make it all happen.

I hope that you all enjoy a restful half term and return to school ready to get involved in all that Langtree has to offer.









# Langtree School is proud to say that we have not one BUT three published authors!

#### Absence Requests (other than for medical appointments)

Parents may not authorise absence; only schools can do this. Schools may authorise any absence they deem appropriate; conversely, they can refuse to authorise any absence. Parents do not have an automatic right to withdraw students from school for a holiday, and, in law, have to apply for permission in advance. Retrospective approval may not be given. Holidays taken during term time without approval from the Headteacher will be recorded as unauthorised. Removal of your child for a holiday in term time without permission without authorisation from the Headteacher may lead to issuing of fixed penalty notice or even prosecution under section 444 of the Education Act.

#### What to do:

Requesting absence should be done in writing at least one month prior to the absence. If the child does not return to school after an agreed period, they may be marked as having unauthorised absence. Requests for absence should be made in writing to the Deputy Headteacher Ms S Burman, via the attendance officer: Mrs Debbie Hayward studentabsence@langtreeschool.com stating the dates of absence and the reason for the absence, the school reserves the right to seek further information about the requested absence
