As we eagerly await the GCSE later this week I wanted to write to all of you to ensure you know where to access the arrangements for Thursday. I was also keen to reassure you that we are working hard to make the day as stress free and positive as it can be. I know there is a lot in the press at the moment about A level results and I wanted to assure you that, whatever next week brings, we are ready to address it.

I must start by re-expressing my sorrow for the way your time at Langtree finished. After most of you had been at the school for 4½ years and have given so much to Langtree during that time it is incredibly sad that we were not able to celebrate all your achievements in the way you all deserved. Please be assured that as soon as the virus has passed we will be holding as many of these traditional events as we can (and you want). I know Mr Nonweiler has already written to you all about the arrangements for next week.
