It has been so pleasing to see the manner in which the whole school community has coped, and actually great progress has continued to be made despite these bumps in the road.

I would like to wish all students and their families a successful term 2, a safe bonfire night and hope we can start to look forward to what we all hope to be a more festive Christmas than we were able to enjoy last year.

Val joined Langtree School in 1966 as a languages teacher and never really left, being both an exams invigilator and a Langtree School Governor after retiring from teaching at Langtree. Val was a positive, cheerful and supportive teacher, invigilator and Governor who will be greatly missed.

Valerie was born in 1942 in New Malden in Surrey.

Val went to school at Holy Cross School in New Malden then Wimbledon County School for Girls before university at Goldsmith's College. Her interest was in teaching and mainly the teaching of foreign languages.

Val was a teacher first at Raines Foundation Grammar School in Stepney, and from 1966 at Langtree School in Woodcote. She was employed at Langtree until retirement (except for periods of maternity leave).

Val used her language skills not only at school but also on school trips to Cancale and Bellême, as well as on holidays abroad.

Ghyslaine, from the exchange school in Bellême, has recently emailed to say that: "Val was indeed a very good friend and a very proficient colleague". Ghyslaine goes on to say that: "She excelled at French and spoke and wrote my mother language as well as any French people. She has been a guideline and a model to me since the beginning of my

career and I have tried to follow in her footsteps to teach as well as she did. I wish we could have met more often."

At Langtree, Val became Head of Department, and after retirement acted as an examination invigilator and School Governor. She organised regular "girls nights out" for her ex-Langtree colleagues.

Val was involved with Woodcote Volunteers, an organisation that arranges transport for local people.

As well as being a teacher, Val was a great wife, partner and very supportive mother. She and Frank have two children (Oliver and Harriott) who were at Langtree before going on to Henley College and university.





Climate Action event at Stowe School

Last Friday, I was given the opportunity to visit the Stowe School Climate Action event with 14 other Geography students from my year. During the trip I was able to hear many famous climate activists speak about the issues surrounding global warming and mainly, what we can do as a school and as individuals to fight them.

I really enjoyed listening to Michaela Strachan talk about her travels over the world to experience the true impact of our lifestyles on the natural world and animal species, and I also found it so interesting to hear the Former Olympic 400m swimmer Neil Agius of Malta speak about his record breaking 52 hour unaided swim across the Mediterranean Sea this summer to observe the impact of plastic pollution in our oceans on sea life.

From this event I have taken away a head full of positive ideas of how we can make change, and so much of what I learnt could really benefit the future of our school in reducing our carbon footprint. For lunch at the event, we were able to make a healthy, zero waste meal with celebrity chef Max La Manna, and this inspired me to think about how we could achieve these sorts of meals more often in the Canteen and what impact it could have on the environment and our health. Using locally grown fruit or vegetables in the production of school meals in the canteen would hugely affect the amount of emissions produced by food miles. Of course, this can be difficult to fully achieve immediately, but over time, little by little as a school we could change our output of emissions considerably.

We all know about deforestation, but I often find myself questioning: "Why are we constantly using up exercise books and paper sheets when we are so lucky to have multiple trolleys full of Chromebooks?" With over 600 students in our school, our

demand for new exercise books is everlasting, yet every time a new one is handed out, more trees are suffering. It could make a massive influence on our carbon footprint and a huge reduction in our paper use if we were open to switching to online learning which could lead us to creating our own future of digital education, completely paper-free!

Probably the biggest thing I have come away with from this event is the idea that there is always something everyone can do, no matter how big or small. Listening to John Sauven (director of Greenpeace UK) give an inspiring talk made me realise that the slightest changes in lifestyle can impact for the better, and it takes us all to change, even just a little, in order to see change on a wider scale.



LOST PROPERTY

When lost property arrives in the school office it is checked for a name. Named lost property is then returned directly to the owner. Unnamed property is kept in the school office in the hope that it will be reclaimed. 2 or 3 times during the school year the unnamed lost property will be made available in the main hall for the students to look through. please help us to return belongings to students by clearly naming all their uniform and other belongings. Thank you.

SECOND HAND UNIFORM

The school office keeps a supply of second hand uniform for students and parents / carers to purchase. We are always happy to receive donations of good quality uniform to add to the second hand cupboard.

Absence Requests (other than for medical appointments)

Parents may not authorise absence; only schools can do this. Schools may authorise any absence they deem appropriate; conversely, they can refuse to authorise any absence. Parents do not have an automatic right to withdraw students from school for a holiday, and, in law, have to apply for permission in advance. Retrospective approval may not be given. Holidays taken during term time without approval from the Headteacher will be recorded as unauthorised. Removal of your child for a holiday in term time without permission without authorisation from the Headteacher may lead to issuing of fixed penalty notice or even prosecution under section 444 of the Education Act.

What to do:

Requesting absence should be done in writing at least one month prior to the absence. If the child does not return to school after an agreed period, they may be marked as having unauthorised absence. Requests for absence should be made in writing to the Deputy Headteacher Ms S Burman, via the attendance officer: Mrs Debbie Hayward studentabsence@langtreeschool.com stating the dates of absence and the reason for the absence, the school reserves the right to seek further information about the requested absence

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
