

Attendance is back to pre-covid levels, above all, the atmosphere in lessons is settled and productive. Our new year 7 students have impressed us with how quickly they have settled in and have become valued members of our school. Our new student leaders, mentors and other older students are demonstrating their leadership skills and proving to be excellent role models.

Specific highlights of the term were the open evening and open mornings for prospective parents - the first we have been able to hold unrestricted, for a number of years. As always our students were the school's finest ambassadors, showing parents and primary school pupils all that is good about Langtree - from the learning they are doing in lessons, their confidence and ability to talk about the school when acting as tour guides and showing off the best Langtree has to offer in so many facets of school life.

While I am on the subject of the financial problems being experienced by so many at the moment, please be aware that we are doing everything we can to support members of our community. The other very pleasing thing to note about this half term is the return to a full programme of extra-curricula clubs, fixtures and societies. I think there is the biggest variety of activities outside of lessons that we have ever offered. We enter more sports teams into more fixtures than any other school in the district - and win far more than our fair share of them too! We have the full range of traditional clubs - choirs, drama, orchestra, Christian Union, book groups, LGBTQ+ and a wide range of sports clubs. However, we have added cubing and chess, debating (KS3 and KS4 groups), history film and Dungeons and Dragons clubs. Finally, we are extremely proud of the excellent exam results that the class of 2022 achieved. As ever though we believe results are only one aspect of the excellent education that Langtree provides.



Drama Club will take a break after this event, as the Drama department begins preparation for the whole school production in mid-March.




Year 7 Brilliant Book Group

More than 6000 whale sharks die from tourism stress.

It is damaging food chains and destroying our planet!.

You don't need a handbag that's been through all this pain, stress and hunger!

You can help stop this by donating to a charity, and, of course, **not** buying that handbag!

5 key things **you** can do to help:
Do you want to help save the whale sharks ? Every single one of us can make a difference to the life of a whale shark. Respect the Oceans; when you go to the beach, don't leave your litter. Also, reduce your Seafood Consumption by choosing sustainable seafood and only eating fish twice a week. Never buy or eat Shark Fin Soup and do not buy or use Shark Products. If we all learn as much as we can about sharks and see them in their natural environment rather tourist parks, then we can save the whale!

Greyhound racing

Do you think greyhound racing is all fun and games? Well if you do, we are about to expose the real truth about greyhound racing. Do you want these loving, beautiful and extraordinary kid -friendly pets to be hurt and abused?

Greyhound racers treat these beautiful, amazing dogs like a machine by locking them up in kennels and cages 23 hours a day. That's only one hour's escape from the kennel. Horrifically, some are locked up for 24 hours! Does that sound right to you?

These cruel owners start racing these hopeless, depressed and gloomy dogs at 18 MONTHS; this can lead to the dog suffering lameness in their legs on and off and can even lead to the damage being permanent. That's permanent damage to the dog's legs! They can also endure with the tortures of arthritis.

There have been 15,000 injuries including broken backs, legs ,head trauma and electrocutions recorded between April 2008 and January 2018 and more then 1,000 dogs have DIED on the TRACK since 2008 and 2019! These heartbroken dogs are being treated like this all for money.

Can you even believe that these poor dogs don't make it past four or five, because of injuries so they have to get put down or die. There are so many greyhounds in shelters that other dogs in the shelter have to get put down so there is room. This is unbelievable!

These beautiful, kind and loving creatures are being abused by the minute we have to do something about it. You could rescue a greyhound to help. That would make such a significant difference in this loving dog's life. Greyhound racing can put out a fire in a dog's heart and then throw them away but you can bring back the fire and make an outstanding difference in these poor dogs' lives.







LOST PROPERTY

When lost property arrives in the school office it is checked for a name. Named lost property is then returned directly to the owner. Unnamed property is kept in the school office in the hope that it will be reclaimed. 2 or 3 times during the school year the unnamed lost property will be made available in the main hall for the students to look through. please help us to return belongings to students by clearly naming all their uniform and other belongings. Thank you.

SECOND HAND UNIFORM

The school office keeps a supply of second hand uniform for students and parents / carers to purchase. We are always happy to receive donations of good quality uniform to add to the second hand cupboard.

Absence Requests (other than for medical appointments)

Parents may not authorise absence; only schools can do this. Schools may authorise any absence they deem appropriate; conversely, they can refuse to authorise any absence. Parents do not have an automatic right to withdraw students from school for a holiday, and, in law, have to apply for permission in advance. Retrospective approval may not be given. Holidays taken during term time without approval from the Headteacher will be recorded as unauthorised. Removal of your child for a holiday in term time without permission without authorisation from the Headteacher may lead to issuing of fixed penalty notice or even prosecution under section 444 of the Education Act.

What to do:

Requesting absence should be done in writing at least one month prior to the absence. If the child does not return to school after an agreed period, they may be marked as having unauthorised absence. Requests for absence should be made in writing to the Deputy Headteacher Ms S Burman, via the attendance officer: Mrs Debbie Hayward studentabsence@langtreeschool.com stating the dates of absence and the reason for the absence, the school reserves the right to seek further information about the requested absence

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
