




























# **UK Intermediate Mathematics Challenge – 2024**

Some awesome mathematics students in Years 9, 10 and 11 entered the national Intermediate Maths Challenge competition this February, with some outstanding results.

The Challenges are run annually by the University of Leeds and over 200,000 students across the United Kingdom participated, with the top 6% receiving a gold award, the next 13% receiving silver, and the next 21% bronze.

Overall there were 6 Gold Awards, for Aidan W, Melissa L, Dom J, Laurie M, Alex H and Seth S, 22 silver awards and 30 bronze awards.

In conclusion, I would rate the book 3



# **Metamorphosis Theatre Visit**

On 21st February, the Year 10 GCSE Drama students went to the Hammersmith Lyric theatre to see a new interpretation of Kafka's 'Metamorphosis', created by Lemn Sissay with theatre company, Frantic Assembly. The production used abstract movement and design to symbolise the mental decline and exhaustion of the main character. Lucy said, 'I enjoyed the unique movement when Gregor turned into an insect, such as the way he was hanging off the light on the ceiling'. Connie commented, 'The repetition of the movement sequence commented, 'The repetition of the movement sequence showing his morning routine, and the way it gradually changed, helped us to understand Gregor's increasing stress'. Costume design student, Molly, observed, 'I liked how in the scene when he got his job, the Dad was wearing the same costume as Gregor had previously, which conveyed that he was taking Gregor's place'.





On Friday 15th March the Food Department held a staff vs students Ready Steady Cook competition. There were 2 staff teams (Mr Bradley, Mr Jupp, and Mrs Parker, Mrs Tontini, Mrs Corrdilet and Mr. Jones) and 2 student steams (Josh Clark, Evie Gainsford, Elin Hayes and Charlotte Binns, Erin Abbott, Thomas Reddington). 


The companies involved showcased the many opportunities for employment within the construction sector. Highlighting the huge range and variety of jobs on offer.

Parents may not authorise absence; only schools can do this. Schools may authorise any absence they deem appropriate; conversely, they can refuse to authorise any absence. Parents do not have an automatic right to withdraw students from school for a holiday, and, in law, have to apply for permission in advance. Retrospective approval may not be given. Holidays taken during term time without approval from the Headteacher will be recorded as unauthorised. Removal of your child for a holiday in term time without permission without authorisation from the Headteacher may lead to issuing of fixed penalty notice or even prosecution under section 444 of the Absence Reguests (other than for medical appointments)

Requesting absence should be done in writing at least one month prior to the absence. If the child does not return to school after an agreed period, they may be marked as having unauthorised absence.
