Vernon Cuthbert writes...



This year sees a large number of national elections across the world. We held ours on the US Day of Independence. The United Sates of America are returning the compliment by holding their Presidential election on Bonfire night, 5th November.

There is little we can do in the UK about this election, except watch and pray, yet the result will impact not just the citizens of the USA but most of the world.

Bonfire night was a celebration required by law for over 250 years following the failed attempt to detonate large quantities of explosives on the occasion of the state opening of Parliament, 5th November 1605. It was marked by special church services, ringing of Church Bells and bonfires. Although now not mandated, it still has a cultural resonance, variously called Firework night, Guy Fawkes night or Gunpowder Plot night.

The desire to destroy the House of Lords had at its root a wish to return England to adherence to the Roman Catholic faith. Following the death of Elizabeth I and with no heir, James VI of Scotland was proclaimed King James I of England as the son of Mary, Queen of Scots. It was hoped that he would return England to Papal oversight yet he sought to consolidate the reforms of the church and steer a middle way, the Via Media that has become the hallmark of the Church of England, between Protestant and Catholic influences.

James I instructed a new translation of the Bible into English, the Authorised or King James Version, and a minor revision of the Book of Common Prayer in 1604. (Originally issued in 1549 with major revision in 1559 both led by Thomas Cranmer, this was then further revised in 1662 to become the BCP we know today). This revision confirmed there was to be no return to the solely Catholic understanding of the Christian faith, so, in the opinion of the plotters, the King and Parliament would have to go!

Although we know of Guy Fawkes, he was merely the explosives expert left in the undercroft beneath the House of Lords to light the fuse to detonate the explosion. There were many other conspirators, not all of whom were punished. His name endures and, for many years, effigies would be created to be representations of Guy and burned on bonfires that evening. These 'Guys' were often used as a means to raise money for fireworks to accompany the bonfire. In time a Guy became synonymous with a badly dressed person, then, later still, any male.

On the occasion of the 400th anniversary ITV broadcast a programme that sought to demonstrate what the explosion would deliver, if the plot had been successful. Anyone within 100m of the explosion would have died and all the stained glass windows of Westminster Abbey would have been blown out. Yet ultimately the plot would have failed

as it is thought there would have been a popular backlash against known Roman Catholics with the majority of the population gathering around the next monarch.

In many ways I am pleased the Observance of 5th November (Thanksgiving) Act 1605 was repealed in 1859 as it indicated a more tolerant attitude to Roman Catholics. There is no longer a sense of them being the enemy within. It marks a nation more at ease with itself. This ease across the denominations has similarly seen the almost complete ending of the use of Guy Fawkes effigies, yet effigies are still used and often reflect disapproval of people, often politicians, in the public eye.

I predict that even bonfires and fireworks will cease as they, arguably needlessly, are a source of considerable air pollution. Air quality in the days following bonfire night is always significantly poorer. Can the climate afford the wanton burning of bonfires and setting off of fireworks purely for the pleasure of some? Pet owners especially will be delighted if the use of loud fireworks ceased.

It is an example of how we use remembering to learn, so that we don't repeat mistakes of the past.

Whitburn Parish Hall was once a thriving hub of activity for community and parish use. As such, it has been a valued resource and has brought much appreciated income to our church funds. This income has, in turn, contributed to our church's financial health and ability to contribute fully to the diocesan Parish Share scheme and to charitable giving.

Since the COVID pandemic, the passing of many hall supporters and following the passing of Jean Atkinson and the retirement of John Shield, running the hall has become a challenge as usage has dwindled and fewer people are willing to attend the larger social events than before. Despite streamlining hall management and the sterling efforts of the church social committee, we are faced with the challenge of deciding the future of our parish hall.

As the elected Parochial Church Council (PCC) we are required to make decisions on behalf of the members of the parish - which includes most of you reading this newsletter - on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish. There are some serious questions to address in relation to the future of the Parish Hall and we'd greatly appreciate your input.

Please give some thought to the questions below and forward your views to one of our PCC members, preferably in writing or by email.

- Do we continue to use the hall via a manager who accepts responsibility for day to day running and bookings at at a cost?
- Do we continue to struggle with advertising and organising social events?
- Do we sub-let the hall to ensure a regular income?
- Do we sell the hall and place funds in the parish reserve account?
- What do we do?
- Are there alternatives to these possibilities?
- We would value your views on a positive, realistic way forward.

In true 60's style, a basket meal is included! All details below.


