~ Christine Alder's funeral

Vernon Cuthbert writes...

I usually end up writing for this space at the deadline. Although there is a risk in this, and the editor would prefer to get it earlier, there is a benefit - I am able to reflect a more up to date situation.

This month I am having to write a little way ahead of the deadline as I will be away then for my eldest child's wedding. There are still a few days to go before I travel for the occasion, but there are other events in my diary to be attended to, including a visit to a family to prepare them for the Baptism of their child. I have also just returned from a visit to the hospice to give communion to a parishioner there for what will probably be the last time.

Joy and sorrow. The church is involved in both.

Sometimes there is more of one than the other. As I write, there is news breaking of the resignation of The Most Reverend and Right Honourable Justin Welby as Archbishop of Canterbury. There is sadness about the necessity of his resignation, yet it was difficult to see how he could continue once a report on Safeguarding was published that determined that he failed to act on knowledge of abuse and did not pass that information on to the police.

We need to acknowledge that there has been significant change in Safeguarding practice within the Church of England. In the 1970's and 1980's it was only informal at best. On my appointment to a post in Durham Diocese in 2008 I underwent a check through the fore-runner to DBS. Since then there has come compulsory training and mandatory action.

There is now a clear expectation to inform a relevant person of any and all disclosures of abuse to children and vulnerable adults, to record the disclosure and action taken. This is an expectation placed on everyone within the church. At a local level the relevant person is the Parish Safeguarding Officer, Deborah Wood, or myself if she cannot be contacted. If the abuse is ongoing then the Police are told.

The compulsory training is for all in roles, but anyone can complete the Basic Awareness course online at:

https://safeguardingtraining.cofeportal.org/

Other online modules in Safeguarding training are: Foundations, Safer Recruitment and People Management, Raising Awareness of Domestic Abuse.

Any other required training is done 'in person' with a trainer guiding the way through the material needing to be covered.

As a Church we must take recognition of the processes within Safer Recruitment and People Management, as an earlier inquiry into Church Safeguarding practice found there was an overreliance on the DBS certification, which is only as good as the information provided. This Good Practice means we must recruit to roles through the use of Job Specifications, an Application Form, and taking up References. It does not matter whether the role to be performed is paid or voluntary. This has been the case since January 2022.

Section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016. requires all authorised clergy, bishops, archdeacons, cathedral chapters, licensed readers and lay workers, churchwardens and parochial church councils to have "due regard" to safeguarding Guidance issued by the House of Bishops. A duty to have "due regard" to Guidance means that the person under the duty is not free to disregard it but is required to follow it unless there are cogent reasons for not doing so. 'Cogent' for this purpose means clear, logical and convincing.

Failure by a member of the clergy to have "due regard" to House of Bishops' safeguarding Guidance is an act or omission which may constitute misconduct under the Clergy Discipline Measure 2003 ('CDM'). Failure by a Reader or lay worker to have due regard to House of Bishops' safeguarding Guidance would be grounds for the revocation of that Reader's or lay worker's licence by the Bishop, and failure by a churchwarden or parochial church council could result in an investigation being carried out by the Charity Commission and the churchwarden or PCC members being disqualified as charity trustees.

All this is needed as there must be confidence that the Church is a safe place to be. That it is safe from abuse, both physical and spiritual abuse, and it is safe for workers, whether volunteers or paid, from accusations of abuse.

This was not the message I wanted to write as I sat down, but felt it was important to acknowledge the unfolding events, even if these events may be old news by the time you get to read this.

I had hoped to concentrate on the joy of Christmas with the arrival of Jesus, Emmanuel - or 'God with us' - as a vulnerable baby. Yet even within the Christmas story there is the massacre by Herod of all Hebrew boys under the age of 2 once he heard of the failure of the Magi to return to him after their visitation in Bethlehem.

Emmanuel means that God understands the sorrows of the world when they are experienced. Joy is not jollity, but deeper and more fulfilling. It is based in the confidence we can have in the promises of God, promises rooted in the resurrection and ascension of Jesus. A rooting that could only take hold once the pain and anguish of the Cross had been experienced.

May you find Joy this Christmas.


