## Backround:

The Saturday school program run by Paiwan has proven very successful for Woodcroft students. The program operates every Saturday in term time at Whitefields secondary school, providing 1 hour of literacy instruction followed by 1 hour of numeracy instruction. In the afternoons, pupils have the opportunity to opt into 'home language' courses, music or drama provided by Paiwan free of cost. Approximately half of the students enrolled from Woodcroft have opted into afternoon classes.

Woodcroft enrolled in the program in the last spring as a trial and opted to pay for the service this academic year. Two teachers from Woodcroft (Miss. Burnett and Mr. Scudetto) share the teaching responsibility for the majority of our students who take part though some siblings who have opted into the program are taught by other teachers (as they are not in the target year group - currently 4-5-6)

Some of those children have continued with the program this year but we have also allocated spaces to siblings and other children with priority needs (year 6 pupils at risk of failing to make required progress). We have been officially allocate 20 spots though have been allowed to register in excess due to the commitment and positive learning attitude of our students. Currently we have 22 on role ( 2 have become inactive in the past month due to 3 missed sessions in a row). When a place becomes available, teachers are consulted to arrange for new pupils to begin in their place.

Paiwan's Saturday school has regularly been in touch and sought advice from John Paxton and in a recent lesson observation, Matthew Scudetto was praised for his excellent lesson delivery. Woodcroft's teachers have been a shining example from the beginning in terms of lesson planning, organization and delivery and have helped other teachers within the program to learn from their practice.

The expectation for each pupil enrolled in the Saturday school program is $2 / 3$ of a level of progress by the end of the academic year. Most children who started in September have made $1 / 3$ of a level already and are on course for $2 / 3$ by the end of the year. Late starters my not show the same level of progress and we will only be able to correctly assess the outcomes in the summer term.

Progress: Numeracy 18 / 22 have made at least 1 sublevel of progress since September.
Reading: 21 / 22 have made at least 1 sublevel of progress since September.
Writing: 17/22 have made at least 1 sublevel of progress since September.
