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Part 1

Introduction to the Spring Report

This report covers the second half of the Autumn term 2014 and the Spring Term 2015.

Part 2. Educational Contexts

CONTEXT 1: New Assessment Processes - Levels abandoned

Assessment levels are now removed, and have been replaced with school based freedoms linked to scaled performance descriptors, new challenging tests, increased floor targets and a new (non-statutory) Foundation Stage baseline assessments. Governors must ensure statutory requirements are in place and school policy and practice is fit for purpose to deliver outstanding outcomes.

Spring Update -

CONTEXT 2: Proposed new service delivery models from Barnet & Academies

Barnet is currently looking at a number of service delivery models that involves further outsourcing of services to the private sector. It is now working towards the creation of a LA company / trust involving a number of stakeholder partners (schools, council, private company) to replace the function of the Local Authority Children's Services.

The Local Authority is actively attempting to create working partnerships between clusters of schools and asked Headteachers to indicate what schools they would consider working with in partnership.

Autumn Update: Woodcroft was part of West Barnet Partnership with Barnfield, Broadfield, Deansbrook Jnr and London Academy. However, we have now formed an Edgware, Burnt Oak and Colindale Primaries Group with Barnfield, Goldbeaters, The Orion, Broadfields, Colindale Menorah Foundation and Rosh Pinah.

A working partnership agreement has been signed by the Chair of Governors

Part 3 Governor Accountability

This section of the report covers aspects of school business that have been reviewed and evaluated and are presented to Governors for approval.

1. Staffing Structure Approval 2015

A new staffing structure is proposed that included two additional posts:

- 1. Family Support Worker
- 2. Parent Ambassadors

2. Parent Consultation and Voice

- Termly Pupil Progress and Attainment Consultation Evenings
 91% Attendance Rate (87% autumn)
 - Annual parent questionnaire see appendix

Overall the percentage of positive responses has remained consistently high with 9 out of 13 criteria achieving 100%. However, the percentage of 'strongly agree' responses has decreased by an average of around 5% in every category (with the exception of pupil progress). It is important therefore that we look at these results and explore further the reasons for the dip in satisfaction in 2015.

Part 4: Ofsted Summary

Woodcroft Primary School was inspected by Ofsted on 2nd and 3rd of December 2015. A report was published on 7th January 2015. A summary outline of key findings is listed below. Governors will be required to develop an agreed action plan to address any areas identified as requiring improvement.

1. The quality of leadership in, and management of, the school is Good

- Clear vision and full support of staff and governors
- · Good school innovations e.g. Passports to learning
- Strong Curriculum esp. AIM@, enrichment via clubs, PSHE & British values
- Good SEN provision
- Good monitoring of disadvantaged pupils
- Good links with local outstanding schools

Governance

- Governors are actively involved in the life of the school and are providing good support and challenge
- Receive good information and make regular monitoring visits
- Good finance and performance management systems
- · Effective safeguarding procedures

Areas for improvement:

- · Need to provide more guidance for parents about how to support pupils at home
- Need to share outstanding practice between teachers within school more frequently
- Need to ensure milestones are included in future action plans so that governors can track progress
- Governors must check the impact of action plans to make sure that improvements happen quickly and effectively
- Governors should ask more demanding questions and check information first hand.

2. Behaviour and safety of pupils are good

Behaviour

- Staff have high expectations and pupils settle quickly
- · Good management systems and pupils are polite
- Pupils are proud to belong to a diverse school
- Effective pupil councils
- Strong emphasis on attendance and punctuality has resulted significant improvements

Safety

- Pupils feel safe and the school has good eSafety provision
- Good provision for SMSC
- · Excellent pupil leadership roles
- Pastoral needs are met and parents 100% happy

3. Quality of teaching is good

- Purposeful classroom
- · High expectations
- Highly skilled TAs
- Highly effective marking but not consistent in small number of classes
- Significant attention given to ensuring pupils have basic skills required
- Broad and innovative curriculum
- · Computing is a strength
- Rich SMSC
- · Excellent music provision

Areas for improvement:

- Need to provide more consistent challenge for the most able
- Improve consistent of effective marking
- Need to increase expectation of parents to support learning

4. Achievement of pupils is good

- Good progress during Foundation Stage
- Improving outcomes in KS1
- Good progress throughout the school to end of KS2
- Significant narrowing of the gap between disadvantaged (pupil premium) and other pupils
- Good progress of SEN through use of well-planned interventions
- The needs of EAL are well met

Areas for improvement:

- Improve outcomes in KS1 phonics
- Improve attendance at parents evenings (above 87%) and increase expectations of parents

5. Early Years provision is good

- Good progress in Nursery through good range of activities and skilled intervention
- Good teaching in Reception with strong relationships established between adults and pupils
- Stimulating outdoor provision
- Good early years leadership ensures accurate assessment
- Safe setting

Areas for improvement:

- Improve opportunities for development of language and literacy in outdoor provision
- Improve achievement of boys in early years
- Use assessments more effectively to plan appropriate activities

Part 5 - Other Business
