# 1.1 Introduction to the Autumn Term Report: School Life

My Headtecaher's Report begins with the sad news that Linda Dent passed away peacefully last month after a long struggle with illness. Linda was the Headteacher of Woodcroft Infant School for 20 years until she retired in 2004. It was only after her retirement that the Junior and Infant Schools then amalgamated to form what is now Woodcroft Primary. Linda spent her life educating and supporting thousands of local children and families, becoming Headteacher of Woodcroft in 1984. When she wasn't in school her other passions were horses and flower arranging. Members of Woodcroft staff who knew Linda attended the funeral and took a floral tribute on behalf of the school.

### **Behave European Project**



Woodcroft hosted two education training conferences in October for 50 teachers from across Europe. The teachers from Italy, Portugal, Belgium and Romania studied alongside Woodcroft staff as part of the BeHave Project. They also experienced teaching methods in English schools and visited our classes. This was the third event in the Behave series. The Belgium and Romania legs take place in the spring term.

# **Tate Year 3 Project**



As part of the Tate Britain Steve McQueen #Year3Project, Woodcroft was selected as one of the schools to be featured in the Outdoor Exhibition. 50 class photographs are being displayed across 600 large billboard posters throughout Greater London this November. Miss Blyth and Class 3B from last year are now on display at 11 locations around London.

The main posting period will be the 4th to 8th November, with each individual poster remaining in place for approximately 2 weeks. This celebration coincides with Turner Prize artist & Oscar winner, Steve McQueen, unveiling his epic portrait of London's school children at Tate Britain. It is one of the most ambitious portraits of citizenship ever undertaken, bringing together tens of thousands of Year 3 school children (all now in Y4) in an epic art work for London. Both our year 3 classes from last year feature in the Tate Britain exhibition.

# AIM@ Information

Woodcroft provides an extended and enriched curriculum. This is exemplified by our AIM@ programmes. Each programme has now gained national accreditation and created its own badge scheme. They are also featured in our updated Homelink book.

- 1. **AIM arts** Award rewards completion of Arts Charter and leads to Bronze arts award in Y6. Awarded termly. Moderated by arts charter review and leadership walkabout. Platinum Artsmark awarded by Arts council
- 2. **AIM@ Digital** Badges were monitored by the IT Governor during the summer term, They reward completion of each unit of scheme of work. Moderated by Computing Lead teacher. NAACE IT Quality Mark was awarded in summer 2017 and work is progressing towards the Advanced 3rd Millennium Award
- 3. **AIM** Sports adopted national values and linked them to PSHE/SMSC curriculum. New bespoke award certificates and stickers implemented this year. afPE Quality Mark and Gold Games Marks achieved (3 successive years).

# Part 3 - Other Business

# 3.1 Woodcroft, Edgware, Barnfield and Broadfields (WEBB) Partnership

Woodcroft is part of a partnership of 4 local schools.

A summary of recent activity includes:

- Monthly Head's meetings
- Shared standards monitoring protocols
- Headteachers acting as Associate Governors
- School's Partnership Project funded by the Educational Endowment Fund (EEF)
- Collaborative staff and pupil events e.g. WEBB Dodgeball and Staff taskmaster Evening!
- Planned joint INSET day on January 6th Curriculum Development

### School Partnership programme

We are now in the second annual cycle of our WEBB Schools Partnership Programme. This is a process of peer review. For this cycle the Headteachers are not leading the reviews (but still participate) as it has been cascaded to last year's Improvement Champions. Each school deputy has now stepped into the role of Improvement Champion. We hope to create a community of leaders who feel comfortable reviewing and supporting and development in each of our schools.

The agreed enquiry questions this term were:

- To what extent is there a shared understanding about excellent pedagogical practise in writing?
- To what extent do teachers demonstrate high expectations in English lessons?

A review day took place on 30th October that involved:

- A subject presentation by the English Lead
- Lesson observations across the whole school
- Pupil interviews
- Subject Leader interviews
- Work samples scrutiny

Outcomes summary from the review day:

### Strengths

- Positive atmosphere in school
- Calm, purposeful learning environment
- Children focussed on activities all understood learning objectives
- Children enthusiastic about writing
- Children happy to share/talk about their work
- Positive relationships observed (CTs/TAs/chn)
- All TAs effectively supported lessons
- Class teachers generally clear in their delivery
- Well-chosen texts and effective stimuli used
- Vocabulary is well developed through sentence/word level activities
- Writing particularly strong when supported by modelling of the process by the teacher
- Marking particularly effective when supported by a clear process of editing / drafting in the classroom

### Areas for improvement


- Ensure the process of modelling of writing and editing of work is consistently effective across the school
- Develop a consistent structure that allows pupils to use feedback effectively to improve their work

### **Improvement Workshop**

On 11th November representatives from each WEBB School will be leading an Improvement Champion workshop at Woodcroft to identify ways forward.
