

## Home Activities for Under 5's and their Families

Idea	Activity	What will I need?
	<u>Make a matching puzzle</u>	<ul> <li>You will need: <ul> <li>Large piece of paper/card</li> <li>Pen</li> <li>Household objects</li> </ul> </li> <li>Draw around lots of different household objects. Let your</li> </ul>
		child then match the item to the drawing. To make it harder you could put the items away so they have to find them first.
KinderArt.com	<u>Spray bottle painting</u>	<ul> <li>You will need:</li> <li>1 or 2 spray bottles (make sure they are free from any chemicals)</li> <li>watered down children's paint</li> <li>large paper or old bedsheet</li> </ul>
		Water down some child safe paint and fill a spray bottle. Let your child spray at the paper or old bedsheet (you can pin to a fence or lay on the floor). If you don't want too much mess just fill with water and spray at a fence- they will see the pattern fade in the sun!





	<u>Make a natural collage</u>	You will need: • leaves/ sticks/ flowers (collect from your garden or on your daily walk) • PVA glue • paper and pens Collect some leaves and sticks on your daily walk. Use PVA to stick down on paper, you can make animals, people the list is endless!
	<u>Use your foot to</u> <u>measure!</u>	You will need: • Scissors • Pen • Paper Daw around your foot and cut it out. Then you can use it to measure things around the house- "how many feet is the kitchen table?" Make this harder by using an adults foot too- "will it be the same number of feet?"
Crast Marry of	<u>lce painting</u>	<ul> <li>You will need <ul> <li>Ice cube tray</li> <li>Lolly sticks</li> <li>Food colouring</li> <li>Paper</li> </ul> </li> <li>Fill an ice cube tray with coloured water and put a lolly stick in. Freeze overnight. Paint with your ice brushes!</li> </ul>





	<u>Make a straw necklace</u>	You will need: • Straws • String • Scissors Cut up straws into 'beads'. Let your child thread them onto a long string and make a beautiful necklace!

Hide a toy	<u>Make a treasure map</u>	<ul> <li>You will need: <ul> <li>Paper and pens</li> <li>Something to hide!</li> </ul> </li> <li>Hide some treasure!</li> <li>Draw a treasure map for someone to follow to find the treasure.</li> </ul>





Shopping Use the things in the house to make a shop.	<u>Make a shop!</u>	You will need: • Table top • Items from around the home- clothes/ toys/ food • Box or basket • Play or real money Set up a role play shop at home! You can start to set prices if your child understands the value of money.
	Pouring and filling	<ul> <li>You will need: <ul> <li>Large tray (or use the bath!)</li> <li>Different size jugs/cups/pans/bowls</li> <li>Water</li> <li>Food colouring</li> </ul> </li> <li>Use the different cups and jugs to mix different colour water if you have used food colouring.</li> <li>Which holds more water?</li> <li>Which holds the least water?</li> <li>How many cups to fill the jug?</li> </ul>
	<u>Make a magic wand</u>	<ul> <li>You will need: <ul> <li>Sticks</li> <li>Paint</li> <li>Wool/ ribbon/ feathers (whatever you can find at home!)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Make sure your stick doesn't have any insects on it!</li> <li>You can tie ribbon or fabric scraps to your wand, paint it, tie feathers on, wrap with wool be creative!</li> </ul>





## Good news, children learn from every day experiences....

- Involve children in household activities e.g. help with sorting washing, setting tables and cleaning
- Encourage children to tidy up after play e.g. 'where do the cars belong?'
- Enjoy cooking together e.g. making sandwiches, cakes and trying new foods
- At mealtimes encourage your child to sit at the table, serve themselves and pour their own drinks.
- Encourage physical movement e.g. dancing, stretching and light exercise
- Share stories and look at books together extend this by talking about emotions e.g. how does a character feel? Why do they feel this way?
- Sing familiar songs and rhymes together
- Encourage mark making and early letter formation e.g. drawing lines and circles and give meaning to their drawings
- Look at text and find letters that are in their name
- Use objects within the home to encourage counting e.g. count coins into a cup or number of steps on the stair case
- Find numbers around the home e.g. on the clock and TV controls
- Encourage your child to follow instructions throughout the day e.g. 'Go and get your.....'
- Talk about shapes and colours in the home e.g. What colour is your shirt? What shape is the window?
- Use scissors to snip paper and practice cutting. You could cut shapes in half to make new shapes e.g. circle = two semi – circles and a square = two rectangles
- Encourage turn taking when playing games e.g. 'Your turn, my turn'
- Practice self-help skills e.g. putting coat on, fasten zips/buttons/laces and clothing such as socks and shoes
- Promote mathematical language such as heavy, light, empty, full, tall, short, big and small.
- Have a selection of items on a tray and take something away 'What's missing?'
- Use open ended questions whilst playing with your child such as 'Which shape looks like a ball?'
- Construction activities e.g. lego and building structures
- Complete fine motor activities such as puzzles and threading
