These staff can return to school in September as long as the system of controls set out in this guidance are in place. The reasons for the disparities are complex and there is ongoing research to understand and translate these findings for individuals in the future. People who live with those who have comparatively increased risk from coronavirus (COVID-19) can attend the workplace. If a child, young person or a member of staff lives with someone who is clinically vulnerable, including those who are pregnant, they can attend their education or childcare setting.
