Risk of coronavirus nfection spreading o Clinically Extremely Julnerable (CEV) and clinically Julnerable (CV) adults	Where schools implement the system of controls outlined in this document, in line with their own workplace risk assessment, PHE and DHSC confirm that these measures create an inherently safer environment for children and staff where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced.  All staff should follow the measures set out in the system of controls section of this guidance to minimise the risks of transmission. This includes continuing to observe good hand and respiratory hygiene and maintaining social distancing in line with the provisions as set out in part 5 of the 'Prevention' section.  School leaders should explain to staff the measures the school is putting in place to reduce risks. 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	Clinically vulnerable staff can return to school. While in school they should follow the sector-specific measures in this document to minimise the risks of transmission.  This includes taking particular care to observe good hand and respiratory hygiene, minimising contact and maintaining social distancing in line with the provisions set out in section 5 of the 'Prevention' section of this guidance. This provides that ideally, adults should maintain 2 metre distance from others, and where this is not possible avoid close face to face contact and minimise time spent within 1 metre of others. While the risk of transmission between young children and adults is likely to be low, adults should continue to take care to socially distanced from other adults including older children/adolescents.  People who live with those who are clinically extremely vulnerable or clinically vulnerable can attend the workplace.  Staff who are pregnant  Employers should conduct a risk assessment for pregnant women in line with the Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999 (MHSW)  https://www.southtyneside.gov.uk/article/36422/Health-and-Safety-Manual-2019 - see Section 3.10 and Appendix F. 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	"Pregnant women from 28 weeks gestation with no other underlying health conditions should work from home if they can. The key is stringent social distancing which may be easier in secondary schools than nursery and primary schools. If stringent social distancing is not possible then homeworking/alternative work is recommended.  1. Pregnant workers over 28 weeks remain at home. 2. Pregnant workers under 28 weeks with underlying health conditions remain at home."  Staff who may otherwise be at increased risk from coronavirus (COVID-19)  Some people with particular characteristics may be at comparatively increased risk from coronavirus (COVID-19), as set out in the COVID-19: review of disparities in risks and outcomes report, which looked at different factors including age and sex, where people live, deprivation, ethnicity, people's occupation and care home residence. These staff can return to school as long as the system of controls set out in this guidance are in place. The reasons for the disparities are complex and there is ongoing research to understand and translate these findings for individuals in the future. 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Risk of coronavirus infection spreading due to large class sizes and reduced space	Special school children cannot be expected to remain 2 metres apart from each other and staff. 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Risk of coronavirus infection spreading due to large class sizes and reduced space	The use of small groups restricts the normal operation of schools and presents both educational and logistical challenges, including the cleaning and use of shared spaces, such as playgrounds, boarding houses, dining halls, and toilets, and the provision of specialist teaching. This is the case in both primary and secondary schools, but is particularly difficult in secondary schools.  Schools should consider how to manage other visitors to the site, such as contractors, and ensure that the risks associated with managing contractors, visitors, catering staff and deliveries, as well as cleaning staff on site who may be working throughout the school and across different groups, are addressed.
