Topics	Crime and Punishment in Britain, c1000-present and Whitechapel, c1870-c1900: crime, policing and the inner city	Early Elizabethan England, 1558–88	Weimar and Nazi Germany, 1918–39
What will students during this unit?	Students will study the development of Crime and Punishment from the year 1000 to the present day. Students will learn about crimes, punishments and law enforcement methods in each period assessing the reasons for change and the impact this change has had on the development of society. Students will also complete a case study on living and policing in the Whitechapel area with a focus on Jack the Ripper and the reasons why this killer was never caught. Throughout this course students will develop their source based enquiry skills and skills which will allow them to assess change and continuity to be able to make an informed judgement.	Students will study the impact Queen Elizabeth had on the country starting from her sister’s rule, Queen Mary Tudor and the problems she faced when she became Queen. Students will investigate how Elizabeth was able to overcome these problems and take England into the ‘Golden Years’ of peace and prosperity, what changes Elizabeth made to religion and how she was able to overcome threats against her position due to this. Students will also look at the development of relations with other countries during Elizabeth’s reign and the reasons for the growth of travel and exploration during this period.	Students will start this topic of study in year 10 and complete the unit upon return to year 11. At the start of the unit students will learn about the legacy of the First World War, the origins of the Weimar Republic and what weaknesses this government faced. Students will also study the reasons for the growth of the Hitler and the Nazi party which allowed this party to take control of Germany and the impact this had on the people of Germany. Students will also be developing their source based enquiry skills looking in depth at a range of historical sources and interpretations of events.
When will students be assessed?	Students will be assessed throughout this unit of study and after the completion of two time periods and following the completion of the entire course. How will students be assessed?	Students will be assessed according to the exam board specification for Paper 1.
