Expectations for Learning

Many families will already be aware that we are moving the whole school onto the Northern Education Trust 'Expectations for Learning' behaviour policy. This 'E4L' policy is designed to make students understand they are responsible for their own behaviour and gives them opportunities to regulate their behaviour before there are consequences, with a strong focus on the positives in the classroom.

It has made a real impact in the year groups we have introduced it to, and we hope to have the whole school using it shortly. Our belief is that teachers should be able to focus on teaching and should not have this interrupted by poor or defiant behaviour.

However, one key message to reinforce at home is that students must not refuse a 'reasonable request' from an adult. For the majority of our students this is just common sense of course! For those that can't meet this simple expectation of courteous behaviour we have a new system ready to help them to learn to be better behaved.




