Everybody had a go at feeding them.





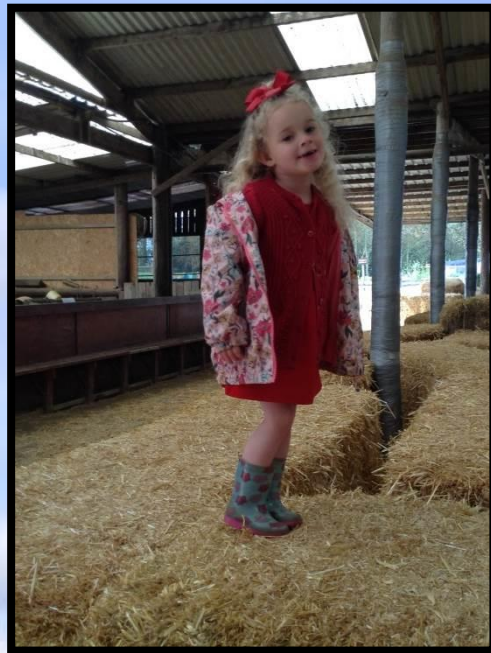

It was very delicate and they had to be very gentle with it.





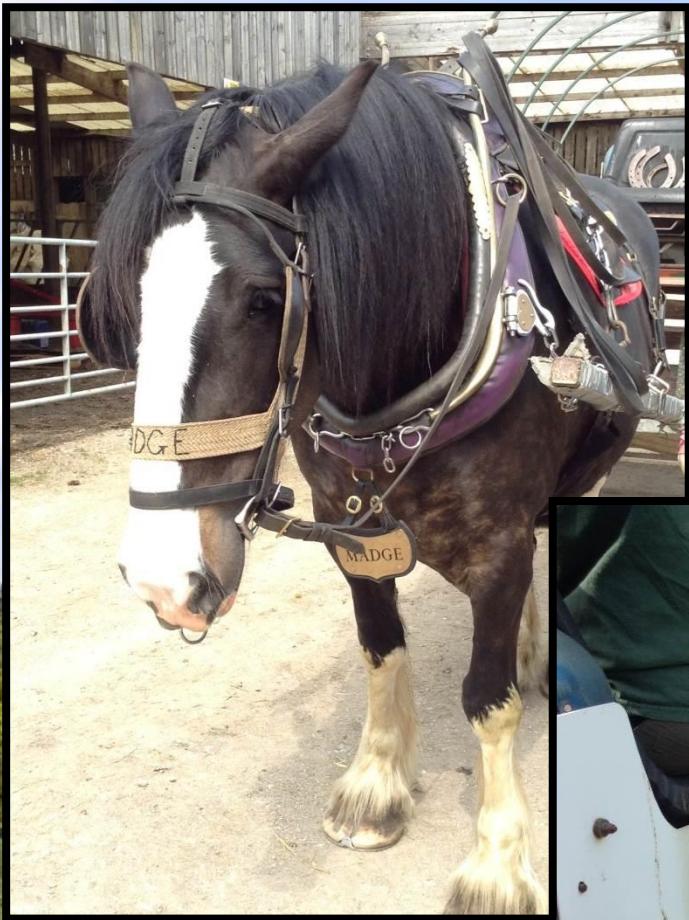
On both days the children went on a cart ride. This is Tinkerbelle.

After a long walk, exploring the farm and finding more animals, we had lunch. After lunch outside it was time for a play. What a happy day!





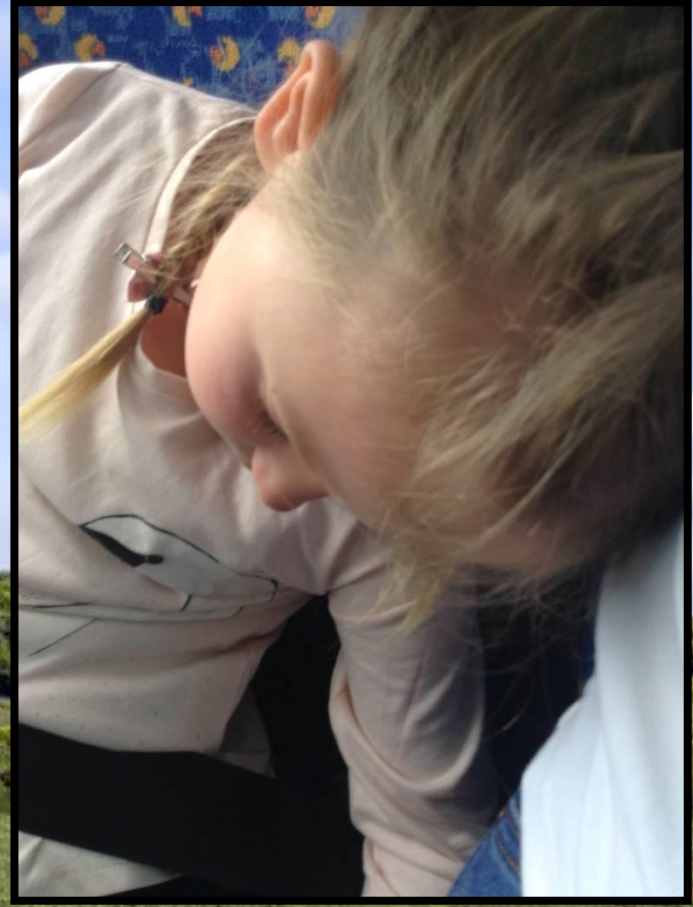




Before we left it was time for the Jersey cows to be milked. The pump that fitted onto their udders was really clever and we could see the milk flowing down the tubes into the container.
