Most governors live in close proximity and half could walk to school. This is reflected in the local population in that 58% do not have a car or van in the household and will have to walk or get public transport. South Tyneside count is 38% and nationally 25% of households have no vehicles.

41% of the local population have no formal qualifications which is significantly higher than national of 22.5%. 40% have level 1, level 2 or apprenticeship education.
