Primary Training - Do I meet the criteria?





To be a successful primary trainee teacher you will need a variety of skills both formal and informal.

Here you will find details on the formal criteria you must meet to be eligible for our primary teacher training programme. Followed by any additional information required for the selection process.

PRIMARY

Formal qualifications:

- GCSE grade C, or above, in English Language
- GCSE grade C, or above, in Mathematics
- GCSE grade C, or above, in Science
- Two A Levels at grade C or above
- A 'good' degree 2:2 or above

Please note, consideration is given to those who have relevant experience. Before you start any training with us you will be required to pass your Professional Skills Tests. These tests help ensure, regardless of specialism, tomorrow's teachers have the core literacy and numeracy skills required. The tests are free and there is more information on passing the tests available online. Two references will also be required with all applications.

Skills & Qualities:

You will be required to submit a written personal statement which explains why you would like to be a teacher and what you would bring to the profession. In the statement you can share your skills, qualities and experience. PBTSA are happy to offer help and support with writing personal statements. CASE STUDY

Bethany School Direct - Primary

What inspired you to become a teacher?

Being a teacher is something that I have aspired to since I began school as a child myself. I loved watching the many different roles taken on by my own teachers. One teacher in particular made me realise how rewarding the job could be as my confidence and enjoyment of school grew when I was in their class. This is something I hope to give to my own class.

After university, I worked for a couple of years as a teaching assistant, in various settings, which only helped secure my ambition to become a teacher.

CASE STUDY

James School Direct - Primary

What inspired you to become a teacher?

Both of my parents are teachers and I grew up hearing their stories about how much they enjoyed the job. it was following my degree that I first considered teacher. I took up a football coaching position abroad and worked with children on a daily basis. It was really rewarding to watch children grow in confidence. Working within the marketing industry wasn't giving me the job satisfaction I craved. Finally, at the age of 32, I bit the bullet and retrained as a teacher!

Why Prince Bishops Teaching School Alliance?

I did the research into the various routes into teaching. I attended an open evening with Durham SCITT and was impressed that they offered the school direct route. I was looking for a hands on experience where I felt that I could become immersed in school life from the outset.

What would you say to anyone thinking of becoming a teacher?

Spend some time volunteering in a school. Be prepared for a lot of hard work, but if you put the work in, the rewards are vast. Seeing children respond well to your teaching makes the planning and resourcing of lesson worthwhile.

Secondary Training - Do I meet the criteria?

The requirements needed to become a Secondary teacher differ slightly from those for primary teachers, but to be successful you'll need a variety of skills, formal and informal. On this page you'll find details of the criteria you'll need to meet and, on the following page, hear from some teachers who have started their Secondary school careers.

Formal qualifications:

- · GCSE grade C, or above, in English Language
- · GCSE grade C, or above, in Mathematics
- · GCSE grade C, or above, in Science
- Two A Levels at grade C or above
- A 'good' degree 2:2 or above

Skills & qualities:

- Organised
- Resilient
- Willing to reflect and learn
- Committed to improving the life chances for young people

References will be required in all cases, as will a well written personal statement which explains why you want to be a teacher and what you'd bring to the profession. Before you start any School Direct Training course with us you'll need to have passed your Professional Skills Tests and had some experience of working in a classroom. The Professional Skills Tests help ensure, regardless of the specialism, tomorrow's teachers have the core literacy and numeracy skills required. Why did you choose to become a mentor with Prince Bishops Teaching School Alliance?

I have enjoyed being a Geography mentor at my school, so was excited by the opportunity to be the Professional Tutor for our PBTSA ITTs. I have always been interested in how pupils learn and sharing new teaching and learning strategies with trainees. I absolutely love it when our trainees bring new ideas to the Academy and share them with each other and within their departments.

What is your advice to anyone who is considering training to teach?

Always take any advice given. It may become overwhelming, but remember that responding to your areas for development and targets to improve will have a massive impact on you becoming an outstanding practitioner. Your mentor and other teachers and staff in your school have a wealth of experience that it is important to make the most of the opportunity to learn from them. Develop the ability to self-reflect; you will be continually asked to reflect on your lessons in order to improve throughout your teaching career.

What is the most important part of your role as a mentor?

Children's education and well-being is central to the teaching vocation and being involved with the training of our next generation of teachers is the most important part of being a mentor to me. To help our ITTs to have the most positive impact on children is fundamental to our role as mentors.

CASE STUDY

Hannah School Direct -Secondary English

What inspired you to become a teacher?

A lot of my friends are teachers and seeing how much effort and dedication they had for their students really inspired me to get into teaching as it's the type of job where you know you're making a difference.

Why Prince Bishops Teaching School Alliance?

I chose to train with the PBTSA as they had a wide range of schools and specialist support on offer. Having a team of trainee teachers also helped as it meant that throughout the year I had colleagues around me going through the exact same things!

How effective has your route into teaching been?

The route I took into teaching has worked really well for me. Being able to get stuck into school life right away meant that I was made to feel like a member of staff from the very outset. I have had a great training year and it has left me feeling eager and prepared for my NQT year!

What would you say to anyone thinking of becoming a teacher?

It isn't an easy job to do but it's absolutely worth it!



CASE STUDY

Mark School Direct -Secondary Geography

What inspired you to become a teacher?

I've always been driven by my passion for Geography, and have been fortunate enough to become a scholar of the RGS and a member of the Geographical Association. As part of these roles, I had a number of opportunities to disseminate my own research and the subject to audiences of all ages and sizes in a number of countries. Of all these opportunities, I enjoyed working with children the most. The interactions and relationships that come with teaching children are very enjoyable.

Why Prince Bishops Teaching School Alliance?

I met PBTSA at a teaching event at my university and was impressed by their approachability and knowledge about the training programme. I later visited one of their teaching schools and was very impressed at how welcome I was made to feel and the professionalism of the training they provided. What would you say to anyone thinking of becoming a teacher?

It's an incredibly rewarding but surprisingly challenging experience. I was fortunate enough to have a lot of experience with my background but the training did present new and unique challenges. However, it's definitely the children that make the job and I would advise anybody considering teaching to visit a school or volunteer with school groups to gain some experience.



CASE STUDY

Yasmin School Direct -Secondary English

What inspired you to become a teacher?

When children talk about what they would like to be when they are older, I always focused on becoming a teacher and used to pretend my teddy bears were my pupils! Now, I love working with young people. Every day is different. I went into secondary teaching because I wanted to bring more than just my subject specialist knowledge to the job: I wanted to play a part in the next generation's development into well-rounded members of society.

Tell us about your route into teaching.

I completed a degree in English Literature and History before finishing a Masters in Modernist and Contemporary literature. I decided a SCITT course would be best for me as I wanted to spend as much time in school as possible.

Why Prince Bishops Teaching School Alliance?

I chose PBTSA because of how organised and prepared my interview day was. I also accepted a PBTSA placement because I had heard how thorough the training would be and I was not disappointed!

What would you say to anyone thinking of becoming a teacher?

It has taken a lot of resilience and persistence to finish the course, but it has also been one of the most rewarding years of my life. If you are hard-working and have a passion to work with young people then you can't go wrong - apply!

How do I apply to PBTSA?

Once you're certain teaching is right for you the first step is to ensure you meet the minimum criteria?

You then need to ensure you understand the detail of the ITT programmes we offer. We run School Direct Training courses in the north east. All our courses run from September to July with fees of £9,000. There are a variety of financial

packages, from Student Finance, available to trainee teachers to cover the cost and fees of living expenses.

If you are satisfied you are in a position to proceed, you can apply via UCAS. Click on the relevant box below. Go to the "Search for a training provider" option and enter either primary code 1YQ or secondary 23F.
