Suggested Activities

- Order pictures of some British monarchs on a timeline; Identify the key roles of a monarch and write them in the form of a fun job description.
- ✓ Explore the significant developments of English life during Elizabeth I's reign through mystery items
- ✓ Make an Elizabethan collage using images from the time of Elizabeth I
- Explore the significant developments of English life during Victoria's reign through mystery items.
- ✓ Make a Victorian collage using images from the time of Victoria.
- ✓ Sort sample fashions and make-up trends into Elizabethan and Victorian.
- Role-play an editorial meeting from a magazine, identifying fashion and make-up trends during the Elizabethan and Victorian eras.
- ✓ Design and make an outfit in the style of either Elizabethan or Victorian fashion .
- Suggest the values of Elizabeth I and Victoria by looking at the symbols found in portraits of them.
- Paint a portrait of either Elizabeth I or Victoria, which includes symbolic items that reflect their values at that time.
- Use the values of monarchs in the past to help them come up with their own values if they were to be king or queen.
- Use historical symbols that represent values to help identify some symbols that they could use to represent their own values.
- Design and make a throne that is decorated in visual symbols that represent the values of the child if they were king or queen.
