- Regularly address and sometimes devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference and significance.

Suggested Activities

- Identify Ancient Greece on a range of different types of maps (Google Earth, Google Maps, Atlas, Globe).

- Compare and contrast the UK and Greece. You could compare both human and physical features.
- How is modern day Greece different from Ancient Greece?
