

## READING NON-NEGOTIABLES

1.	GUIDED READING SESSIONS - will take place for half an hour each
	day in KS1 and KS2 and for fifteen minute in Early Years.
	Early Years - 11.45-12.00, KS1 - 11:30-12:00 and KS2 11:45-12:15
2.	<b>READ THREE TIMES A WEEK</b> – The expectation is that children will
	have clearly marked (by in adult) in their home/school reading diary
	that they have read with an adult three times a week OR that an adult
	has modelled the reading to the child. In KS2, children can record what
	they have read in their home/school reading diary themselves however
	this must then be signed by an adult.
3.	HOME/SCHOOL READER - Children must read their home/school
	reader at least once a week. However we do encourage children to read
	a wide range of texts and genres therefore the other two entries in the
	home/school reading record can be linked to pupil choice e.g. book,
	comic, newspaper article, leaflet, website etc.
4.	<b>READING WORKSHOPS</b> - These will be offered to parents at least
	twice a year to aid with the reading process at home.
5.	GUIDED READING BOOKS (PROJECT X SCHEME KS2, LITTLE
	WANDLE Rec & KS1) - Project X is to be used within school for guided
	reading only, whereas our Little Wandle books are used for Guided
	Reading & Home Reading
6.	<b>READING RECORDS</b> – MUST be signed by an adult within school each
	time they read with a child, the signature will be accompanied by a
	sticker indicated which member of staff has read with the child.
	Reading records MUST be signed by an adult at home three times a
	week, in line in with the homework policy. Reading record the
	home/school reader must be brought into school daily.
7.	<b>REWARDS</b> – Reading rewards now link with the homework policy and our
	homework rewards system 'Homeworkopoly', please see our homework
	policy for more details.
8.	<b>DISPLAY</b> – Each class will have a display showcasing their rewards and
	book reviews.
9.	<b>READING AREA</b> - Each class will have a designated reading area which
	includes a range of organised and easily accessible reading material,
	alongside some reading prompts. The reading display which showcases
	rewards and book reviews should be included within this area.

10. GU	JIDED READING PLANNING - this will be planned at the start of
each	n week and will ensure each group has the opportunity to read twice a
W	eek with an adult. All guided reading planning must follow the same
fo	ormat and comments written for each child during the session must
	support reading assessment and demonstrate progress.
11. WC	<b>DRK GENERATED FROM GUIDED READING</b> - this will be placed in
	English books with a clear learning objective and success criteria.
12. NO	<b>DT READING AT HOME</b> - The reading diary MUST be signed by a
p	arent on each occasion the child reads (three times a week) or the
re	ading task will be deemed as one missed homework. If children are
n	ot having their reading record signed and therefore not reading at
ł	nome on more than three occasions a letter will be sent to parents
re	garding a meeting with the class teacher in the first instance and if
this	continues then with the Key Stage Leader. In addition, children will
be	asked to 'catch up' on their reading on Friday afternoons or during
lunc	htimes or playtimes. When reading is checked each Friday, a line will
	be ruled under to indicate the week's reading have been counted.
13. CL	ASS NOVELS - Every class will engage in a class novel for the last
fif	teen minutes of each school day. The class novel can be but does not
	need to be related to curriculum topics; it must be a book that
de	monstrates the value of reading for enjoyment. The children must
	have input into the novel selected.
14. CA	TCH UP READING SESSIONS - In school, each class will run short
read	ding sessions with children in their class, at a time appropriate within
tł	ne working week. These sessions will be for children who need some
ad	ditional support or who are not being read with frequently at home.
