On the 24th November staff and students took part in <u>#NoPensWednesday</u> which is an initiative to improve communication skills for students of all ages. Here are some of the activities:-

Both Year 11 and 8 took part in Poetry Recitation. Students really enjoyed sitting back and using their listening skills to appreciate the words and meaning of the poems.

Yr 10 students used images to create narratives for creative writing.

Year 9 and 10 Media Studies students undertook magazine cover analysis in groups - being able to discuss the feature of the magazine using media language is a really good skill to acquire for their GCSE course.

In Maths, students created 3D shapes to explore area and measurements.

Hospitality & Catering students took part in cookery practicals. Year 10 baked mini Christmas cakes and fairy cakes. Communication and good listening skills are vital in a busy kitchen.

Year 11 took part in virtual mock interviews with local employers arranged by Leicestershire Cares and our Careers Coordinators. A fantastic opportunity to practice real-life communication skills ready for college or employment.

Year 7 took part in a role-play Q&A with the characters from their reading book, The Terrific Thing that Happened to Barnaby Brocket.

In Geography Year 7s watched and discussed how low income countries cope in temperatures over 50oC. In groups and using just two sheets of A3, one glue stick and one pair of scissors they had to create something to help keep people in poverty cool.

It was fantastic to see so many creative and innovative ways to support learning. The day also helps teachers to identify pupils who need additional support or need to learn using different methods. Well done to Mrs Hendra for coordinating the event.


Winstanley Wedding

They have worked with various groups to find out what problems and challenges exist in our community to actively questioning the local council and politicians for solutions.




Let SHINE
