During Tutor Time students have also been thinking about what we can learn from the holocaust to make the future a better place. Students have been discussing these thoughts and creating a group pledge based on this year's theme - ONE DAY. It's an important part of our school ethos, to enable our young people to have a voice and encourage them to be kind, thoughtful and to respect difference, so that they become proactive citizens who strive for social justice.









Challenge Partners visited The Winstanley School at the end of January. Their aim is to reduce educational inequality and improve the life chances of all children. Through collaboration, challenge and professional development, they work to ensure every school community can benefit from the combined wisdom of the education system.

They were very positive in their praise of our school and have given constructive advice on areas which can be improved. Below are some comments which we are particularly proud of!

Students benefit from a curriculum designed to develop the whole child and to raise their aspirations by developing a growth mindset to improve their skills, knowledge and understanding.

Leaders prepare students very well for life in modern Britain through the active citizenship programme. As a result, students are prepared to challenge inappropriate behaviour and articulate what is needed to be active global citizens.

Lessons are tailored to meet the needs of disadvantaged students and students with SEND and that enables them to make the same progress as their peers.

Subject leaders carefully map the curriculum to ensure that overlap between subjects reinforces students' learning.

Lessons link to real life examples to provide authentic learning experiences.

Reading for pleasure is an integral part of the curriculum and students are provided with opportunities to read more widely. As a result, the gap in examination results has been reduced between disadvantaged and other students in the school.

Students are invariably wellbehaved in lessons: this leads to them being effectively engaged in their learning.

Relationships between staff and students are very strong which supports students' well-being. Students trust staff to support them when they are faced with challenges in and out of school.
