the Food Bank in Braunstone. They have also been kind enough to put together some festive goody bags for families in our community to help make Christmas special during these difficult times.



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

Geography News

This term Year 7 students have delved into the mysteries of the North and South Poles, not merely studying the indicators of climate change, but also examining the ways in which animals, scientists, and the Inuit people adapt to these extreme conditions.

Progressing into Year 8, our budding geographers have scrutinised the formation of tropical storms and the catastrophic repercussions of various hurricanes, from Ian to Katrina. Year 9 saw our exploration of the Land of Fire and Ice – Iceland - unravelling the dynamics of tectonic activity, its advantages, and its somewhat

precarious downsides. Advancing to Year 10, focus shifted to the intricacies of flooding in the south-west of England before whisking our attention to the north-east, where we uncovered the mysteries of the River Tees and examined the strategies employed to manage the river's unpredictable nature. In Year 11, our spotlight has been on Birmingham, where we've delved into the opportunities and challenges within the city, ranging from issues of pollution to employment. This takes us onto our recent urban fieldwork trip to Birmingham's Frankfurt Christmas Market, where we aim to evaluate the success of the city's regeneration efforts.
