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



aster 2024 World Book Day is a great opportunity to celebrate the thriving reading culture we have developed here at The Winstanley School in recent years. We take great care to ensure that we dedicate curriculum time to boosting students' reading skills while promoting a love of books. Through our reading lessons we have made sure that

all students are reading regularly and have access to texts that are interesting and challenging. This year up to 30 different texts have been, or are currently being read by reading groups during our extended tutor time. The selection of books is extremely diverse. Some groups are reading classic texts such as Steinbeck's 'Grapes of Wrath' or Harper Lee's 'To Kill a Mockingbird' whereas other groups are reading highly

acclaimed, or award-winning, modern young adult novels such as Katya Balen's 'October, October' and Jason Reynaulds' 'All American Boys'. A group of our Year 11



students read 'Sapiens' by Yuval Noah Harari and were able to use the text to debate evidence concerning the evolution of the human race. This eclectic selection enables all of our students to really broaden their horizons and gain a deeper understanding of the world around them. The lessons also play a valuable role in helping our young people to develop a wider vocabulary and practice their comprehension skills.



Chocolate

Year 8 recently visited Cadbury World as part of their African Superpower unit. In the classroom, students have been

learning about how industries like cocoa production in countries across Africa can aid development and how unfair

trade does not help them.

Today they had a talk from one of the historians at Cadbury's and learnt about how Cadbury works with Fair Trade and Cocoa Life to help local communities as 90% of Ghanaian Cocoa comes from familyrun farms smaller than 5ha. Of course, they then had a great time sampling chocolate going on the 4D ride and trying their hand at chocolate artistry!

The people were all so joyous and friendly. They also had a tour through the slums to see some of the housing, seeing first hand the ingenious way of life for so many. Finally as it was ASHAs 35th Birthday they were treated to a celebration of speeches, music and dancing. Mr Megginson is keen to continue to support ASHA and will be using many stories and photos in lessons as well as establishing links with some of the teaching staff and university students over in New Delhi.

Excellence


