Our Aims

Aims

Our aims for worship are:

- To offer glory and thanks to God.
- To provide pupils with the opportunity to pray.
- To ensure acts of worship are meaningful and relevant to pupils.
- To encourage participation of all pupils in services and acts of worship.
- To challenge pupils to think about Bible stories and teaching and thereby to provide all pupils with an opportunity to reflect upon Christian beliefs and values.
- To prayerfully celebrate Christian festivals.
- To develop an understanding of acts of formal worship in the Christian Church.
- To mark or celebrate occasions of importance to the school and to the wider local and national community.
- To respectfully acknowledge festivals, traditions and beliefs of other faiths.
- To define and reinforce the shared values and ethos of the school community.

Who is this Policy for?

In order to achieve our Vision set out above we all have certain roles and responsibilities we need to fulfil.

As governors we will:

The Role of our Rights Respecting status in this policy

Class Charters

Class Charters are developed with all the children in every class at the beginning of the academic year. These agreements are then constantly reinforced and referred to by the teachers and the pupils across the course of the year to ensure everyone is accessing their rights.

Worship in our School

Children experience different acts of worship throughout the week which reflect the Christian Year. Collective worship is in the form of whole school, phases and class worship. different classes are

Through attending Collective Worship as a whole school pupils and staff hear a shared message. At the very start of the week whole school collective worship delivers a big question which is then followed up by staff throughout the week including Class worship. Class worship enables children to record their thoughts and ideas. Children share their prayers in whole school CW and have time to reflect and write their own prayers in class worship.

We have close links with our local schools and join them at their Church. Through this children experience a different Church experience.

Children at Holy Trinity have a very good knowledge of the Trinitarian nature of God due to the name of our school. Whole school work is completed on the Holy Trinity as 'stand-alone' sessions

Prayer Circles:

Purpose:

- To provide children with the opportunity to be still, reflect and pray if they wish to, for those things that are important to them.
- For children to engage in local and national news.
- For children to understand that prayer leads to action and change.

Preparation:

- Each collective worship area must have a prayer book set up where children can write their own prayers in.
- Each collective worship area must have a prayer box where children can post prayers they want to be kept confidential cards must be made available for children to write on.
- Teachers consider things they wish to bring to the children's attention news related/school related/class related
- Teachers choose an item of news to reflect and discuss

Prayer circle time:

• This takes place once a fortnight in classrooms during collective worship time.

Right of withdrawal

We expect all children to attend collective worship. However, any parent/carer can request permission for their child to be excused from attending religious worship and the school will make alternative arrangements for the supervision of the child during the period concerned. Parents/carers do not have to explain or give reasons for this. This complies with the 1944 Education Act and was restated in the 1988 Education Reform Act.

The Headteacher keeps a record of all children who withdraw from collective worship.
