What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	26%	This academic year has been marked by a period of transition for our swimming provider, with a change in coaching staff and the ongoing development of their assessment system. Unfortunately, a pool closure resulted in the loss of a swimming session, which could not be recovered due to scheduling constraints. It is important to note that these circumstances have affected all schools within the borough, and collaborative discussions with Camden PE Leaders have been initiated to address these issues for the forthcoming academic year.
