
Put a circle around all of the pronouns in this box. Underline all of the nouns.





For each sentence, circle the pronoun(s) and underline the noun it means. Look at the example.

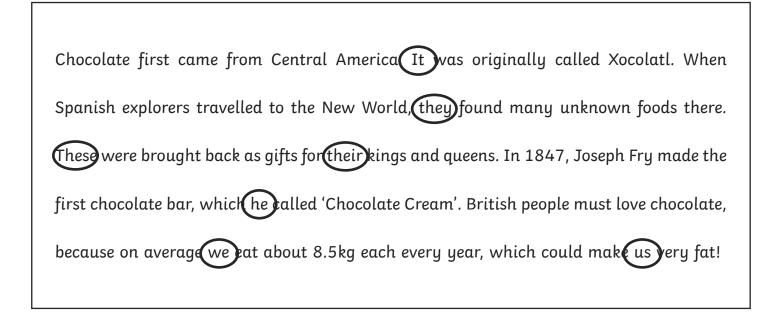
When Harry put <u>his rabbit</u> down, it hopped away.
