

Changing Adjectives and Verbs

We can change the meaning of adjectives and verbs by adding -ed, -er and -est.

Adding '-ed'

To add '-ed' to a word that ends in '-y' with a consonant before it...
...change the '-y' to 'i' and add '-ed'.

Just like this.

reply > repli + ed = replied



Adding '-ed'

To add '-ed' to a word that ends in '-y' with a consonant before it...
...change the '-y' to 'i' and add '-ed'.

Just like this.

reply > repli + ed = replied


try > tried dry > dried

Adding '-er'

To add '-er' to a word that ends in '-y' with a consonant before it...
...change the '-y' to 'i' and add '-er'.

Just like this.

happy > happi + er = happier




Adding '-est'

To add '-est' to a word that ends in '-y' with a consonant before it....
...change the '-y' to 'i' and add '-est'.

Just like this.

heavy > heavi (+) est (=) heaviest



Stressed /er/ Spelt 'ur'
