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### Brief introduction to subject:

This one-year course can be taken as a fourth option in Year 12 to complement subjects such as mathematics, biology, physics and chemistry. The variety of assessment styles used, such as recreative writing, commentary writing, discursive essays and research-based investigative writing, allows students to develop a wide range of skills. These include the ability to read critically, analyse, evaluate and undertake independent research, which are invaluable for both further study and future employment.
