Subject overview: FILM STUDIES

Subject Rationale (Intent) linked to whole school curriculum mission

In brief (no more than four sentences)

Film Studies will engage students with the wider world and increase their cultural capital via a range of international films, which examine how people and places are diversely represented on screen. Students will learn how meaning is created via the medium of film, both in technical aspects of filmmaking and in terms of narrative, genre and representation. The subject promotes deeper critical thinking and enables students to apply a range of critical analytical tools. They will develop their technical and creative abilities.

The schedule below is designed so that AS level and 1st year A Level can be co-taught in the first year.

If the Academy opts to only teach AS level, the schedule will be as for Year 12, minus content in bold.

If the Academy opts to only teach A Level, some modifications would be needed to the below to optimise teaching of the course, in which Global Cinema and Mainstream American Film units can be taught inside the same academic year.
